Review: What is at stake with every temptation?

- Your <u>future</u> is at stake
- Your <u>family's</u> future is at stake
- You <u>faith</u> is at stake

Remember: Every temptation ask the question – "Can God be trusted with this?"

Two general views of God:

Some people think about God <u>in the abstract</u> - Ultimately, God is not interested in my daily affairs, they are up to me

Some people recognize God <u>in the specifics</u>- Truthfully, God is interested in my daily affairs; He is interested in me

Temptation #1: Meet a legitimate need in an illegitimate way

Matthew 4:1 Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil.² And when He had fasted forty days and forty nights, afterward He was hungry.³ Now when the tempter came to Him, he said, "If You are the Son of God, command that these stones become bread."

- This temptation comes when <u>I have a legitimate need</u>
- This temptation comes when <u>I don't see another way</u>
- This temptation comes when <u>there is something I could do</u> to meet my own need

Answer #1 – God knows what I need, <u>I will wait for Him.</u>

Matthew 4:4 But He answered and said, "It is written, '*Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God.*" (See also Deuteronomy 8:1-20 especially verse 3)

- God can be trusted with our daily needs
- God is **who we need**
- God is who actually gets tested
- God will build your faith <u>in the gap</u>

Psalm 27:13-14 I would have lost heart, unless I had believed That I would see the goodness of the LORD In the land of the living. ¹⁴ Wait on the LORD; Be of good courage, And He shall strengthen your heart; Wait, I say, on the LORD!
