We are wise if we read both the *WORLD-book* and the *WORD-book* as two volumes of the same work — and you then respond: "My Father wrote both of them!" (Charles Spurgeon)

Background to Psalm 19

- Author: David
- Type of Psalm: A Psalm (plucking for a string instrument) &
- **Purpose/Subscript:** for the Choir Director (title to Ps 20; intention: to be sung, memorized, hidden in the heart).
- Ps 19 is *David at his finest*. It is Hebrew, poetic, literary, rhetorical, structural masterpiece in Hebrew. No wonder Beethoven, Mozard, Haydn were influenced by *this psalm* in their music.
 - Paul loved Psalm 19. The outline, flow & themes of Ps 19 seem to impact the structure & flow of Romans.
 - Also: Ps 19 specifically impacted Romans 1:18-32 and Romans 10:18 (calling for universal praise!).

Psalm 19 Outline & Structure

- vv. 1-6 God's glory in the Skies ; (the WORLD book) // Focus on "God" (1x) // General revelation [all men everywhere]
- vv. 7-14 God's glory in Scriptures; (the WORD book) // Focus on "LORD"/Yahweh// Special revelation [in Scripture; to save]

THESIS — This psalm speaks & sings & shouts forth that *God Has Revealed Himself!* And he has done so in 2 wonderful ways...

I. GOD HAS REVEALED HIMSELF IN THE VISIBLE WORLD (1-6)

A. in vv.1-6 — God's Heavens Actively Shout: "Look at This Powerful Creator!"

★HOW?? God reveals/proclaims himself ...

- 1. celestially (1) the heavens/expanse (skies)
- 2. daily (2a) day & night
- 3. clearly (2-3) -
- 4. orderly (4) (line by line/utterance order, skill, design) -
- 5. mightily (5) -
- 6. expansively (6) -

From God's revelation in the visible world...

- 1. we know God exists (every single person!)
- 2. all people everywhere have this visual knowledge (none excluded)
- **3.** creation informs all that God is powerful and glorious Creator
- 4. the superstitious who are enslaved to the worship of nature are idolatrous (cf. Rom 1.25)
- 5. The intelligent secularist and elite atheist see less than the heavens reveal (they are blind)

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- What must you do???
- 1. PONDER him!
- 2. PRAISE him!
- 3. PROCLAIM him!
- 4. PRESUPPOSE him!

II. GOD HAS REVEALED HIMSELF IN THE WRITTEN WORD (7-14)

A. v.7-9—The ATTRIBUTES of Scripture

- Note the structure of each of the 6 poetic lines:
- *identification* (Law of the Lord) >> *description* (is perfect) >> then *action* (converting the soul)

O LORD, give us affections toward your holy Word in some measure that is proportioned to its supreme excellence. For we can never love TOO MUCH what we can never admire enough. Oh let us elevate our appreciation for the Word and our affection and submission to the WORD. It is the very communication-breath of God Himself. (George Horne)

B. v.10-11 — The APPRECIATION of Scripture

A Christian should read this precious Book every day with earnest prayer and meditation. (George Mueller)

Since God's WORD is like this...

- ★ read it humbly
- ★ study it systematically
- ★ teach it consistently
- ★ cherish it preeminently
- ★ obey it happily

C. v.12-14—The **APPLICATION** of Scripture

✓ None are so wise — as those taught by the wisdom of Scripture

✓ None are so happy — as those who hear & obey the blessednesses of Scripture

✓ None are so protected — as those who cling to the promises of God

 \checkmark None are so other-worldly — as those who imbibe the wisdom from above

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GENERAL REVELATION and SPECIAL REVELATION

edited & adapted from Joel Beeke, RC Sproul, R. Fowler White

Christianity is not based on moralisms or speculative philosophy; it is a *revealed* faith. But it makes a distinction between *general* revelation (in creation) and *special* revelation (in the Bible).

General revelation: the universal disclosure of God in nature, in providential history and in moral law within the heart (conscience), whereby all persons at all times and places gain a rudimentary understanding of the Creator and his moral demands. (Romans 1:18-20).

God's general revelation is called *general* because it is given to every human being in the entire world. It is given in and through *nature* and through the human conscience (which is why it is sometimes called "*natural* revelation"). "The heavens declare the glory of God" (Psalm 19:1). God has given all human beings a sense of right and wrong (Rom. 2:14-15). General revelation does *not* reveal God's work as *Redeemer*, only His work as *Creator*. One cannot study a sunset and see the heavens declaring God's plan of salvation; which is precisely why God's special revelation in the Bible is necessary for salvation.

Special revelation: God's self-disclosure in redemptive history and in the interpretive word of Scripture whereby He makes Himself and His truth known at specific times and to specific people. God cannot be known redemptively except as He reveals Himself to us. Jesus is the culmination of God's self-disclosure to man and since Jesus cannot be separated from His word, the Scriptures are the ultimate form of divine revelation from God to us, for without them, we would know nothing certain about Jesus or any of the Divine Persons of the Holy Trinity.

Jesus Christ is the Incarnate Word (John 1:1, 14), the One who embodies the very Word of God (Heb. 1:1-2). Jesus said to His disciples: "he who has seen Me has seen the Father" (John 14:9). The chief of all Apostles, the One whom God chose as His ultimate vehicle of self-disclosure, is Christ Himself. In Christ we meet the fullness of the revelation of the Father, and it is only through Scripture that we meet Christ.

The Bible gives us no reason to expect that God will speak to His children today apart from the Scriptures. Those who teach otherwise need to explain to God's children how these words "freshly spoken from heaven" can be so necessary and strategic to God's highest purposes for their lives when their Father does nothing to ensure that they will ever actually hear those words. Indeed, they must explain why this is not quenching the Spirit. Moreover, the promise of such guidance inevitably diverts attention from the Scriptures, particularly in the practical and pressing concerns of life. Let us never underestimate just how serious this diversion really is. In the Bible the church hears God's true voice; in the Scriptures, we know that He is speaking His very words to us. Advocates of words "freshly spoken from heaven" should beware: By diverting attention from the Scriptures, they quench the Spirit who is speaking therein.

 \checkmark 'Their voice has gone out to all the earth, and their words to the ends of the world''' (Rom. 10:18).

 \checkmark "The heavens proclaim his righteousness, and all the peoples see his glory." (Psalm 97:6)

✓ "In the past God spoke to our forefathers through the prophets at many times and in various ways, but in these last days He has spoken to us by His Son" (Hebrews 1:1-2).

Implications:

- 1. God Has Spoken, So We Must Obey Him
- 2. God Has Spoken, So We Must Teach Others of Him
- 3. God Has Spoken, So We Must Glorify Him

HOW GREAT THOU ART!

Singing God-centered hymns is desirable, but more than that is needed. We sing what we feel, what we believe. When once we rediscover the greatness of God (in the Word), we will sing it. Our song will echo our conviction. (Tom Wells)
