- I. Introduction and review.
- **II.** Beware of the false teachers who corrupt the gospel. v. 7-9
 - A. They seek to knock you off course. v. 7
 - 1. You were off to a good start. 3:1-3 4:4,14-15 2:2 Heb. 12:1ff 1 Co. 9:24-26
 - 2. Then these heretics cut in on you and tripped you up. Mt. 7:13-14
 - 3. They are influencing you to disobey the truth (of the gospel). 2:5 John 6:28-<u>29</u> Ro. 1:5 2:8 16:26 Acts 17:30 5:32
 - 4. Paul is trying to get them back on course.
 - 5. Application: We all need accountability.
 - B. What is the source of this legalistic error? v. 8
 - 1. These teachers did not come from God.
 - 2. God called you through a very different message (grace). 1:6,15 5:13 Jo. 10:4-5,27
 - 3. A teacher may be persuasive, sincere, passionate and successful, but if he is not proclaiming the gospel of grace he is NOT of God. 1:8-9
 - 4. The one who is not of God is of the devil. John 8:44 Mt. 13:25,28
 - C. The corrupting influence of error spreads rapidly. v. 9
 - 1. Leaven (yeast) in bread dough illustrates how something large can be quickly permeated by something very small. Ex. 12:15,19 13:7 Mt. 13:33 16:6,11-12
 - 2. A few false teachers can disturb an entire church. Acts 15:1,5 20:29-30
 - 3. An error on one point of the gospel severs a church from Christ. 5:2,4 2:16
 - 4. There are many who call themselves Christian and affirm many of the doctrines of Scripture, yet they mix the leaven of human works with God's grace.
 - 5. Satan's strategy is often to mix a little bit of error with a lot of truth, thus destroying the gospel. <u>2 Cor. 11:14-15</u>
 - 6. Leaven also illustrates how sin can spread in the church. <u>1 Co. 5:6-7</u> 2 Ti. 2:16-17 Deut. 21:21
 - 7. We need leaders who will fearlessly and faithfully defend the purity of the gospel. 1:7-9 2:11ff Acts 20:28-30 2 Tim. 1:13-14 <u>Titus 1:9</u>
- III. The legalists will not succeed. v. 10
 - A. True believers will persevere. v. 10a
 - 1. Paul finally declares the outcome he anticipates the Galatians will come back. 1:11 3:15 4:12,28,31 5:11,13 6:1,18
 - 2. His confidence is in the Lord. Phil. 1:6 2 Th. 3:4 John 10:27-29 1 Pet. 1:3-5
 - B. The troublemakers will be judged. v. 10b <u>2 Co. 11:14-15</u> Js. 3:1ff
 - 1. This judgment is also a work of God Who judges impartially. Rom. 12:19
 - 2. Jesus' sharpest words of condemnation are reserved for false teachers who lead others astray. Mt. 18:6-7
 - 3. Let this be a warning to false teachers who would dare to disturb the church. Js. 3:1ff 1 Pe. 4:17

IV. Imitate Paul's great zeal for the gospel. v. 11-12

- A. Paul is uncompromising in his declaration of the gospel. v. 11a
 - 1. Paul could have avoided persecution if he had been willing to compromise with the Jewish legalists. Acts 9:22-23 13:45 14:19 17:5,13 18;12 21:27f f 23:12 26:21 2 Co. 11:24-26
 - 2. Many throughout history have compromised in order to please men. Pr. 29:25
 - 3. Do we want to be popular or do we want to be faithful? Acts 4:12 John 14:6
- B. Why is the cross such a stumbling block (offense) to so many? v. 11b 1 Co. 1:18ff
 - 1. The Jews were offended by the idea of a suffering Messiah Who was cursed of God. 3:13 1 Co. 1:18,22f
 - 2. The Greeks/Gentiles sought a more sophisticated system of earthly wisdom.
 - 3. The cross reminds us that we are sinners who have no righteousness of our own.
 - 4. People feel insulted when they are told that God rejects their works.
 - 5. People are disturbed when they are told that their sin deserves God's curse and that the only way they can be reconciled to God is through Jesus Christ being made a curse in their place. 3:10,13 Ro. 9:32-33 1 Pet. 2:6,8 Ps. 118:22 Mt. 21:42
 - 6. People are upset when they are told that there is nothing they can do except to repent and believe. 2:16 2 Ki. 5:9-14 John 3:14-15
 - 7. There are many enemies of the cross in our day. Phil. 3:18
- C. Paul pronounces a curse on those who trouble God's people by corrupting the gospel. v. 12
 - 1. Let those who would mutilate the gospel by adding works mutilate (castrate) themselves. Deut 23:1-2
 - 2. Does Paul go too far? <u>1:9</u> Phil. 3:2 1 Co. 16:22
 - 3. Jesus was harsh with those who led others astray and wasn't afraid of offending them. <u>Mt. 15:12-14</u> <u>Luke 17:1-2</u>
 - 4. Paul is zealous for the gospel and has righteous anger against those who would corrupt it, thus dishonoring God and harming His people.
 - 5. It is interesting that Paul makes such a strong condemning statement just as he begins to develop his theme of the gospel producing love. 5:6,13ff
 - 6. Do we share Paul's passion for the gospel and the people of God?
 - 7. We should also remember that there are other issues not worth fighting over. Phil. 1:15-18 Rom. 14-15
