Then read Titus 2:9-15, giving careful consideration to each of us living together to adorn the doctrine of God with the right understanding and use of gospel and law to build Christ's church. Read and re-read Titus 2:11-15 and pray through it with the help of the outline.

Titus 2:9–15 <sup>9</sup>Exhort \_\_\_\_\_\_ to be obedient... to be well pleasing in all *things*... that they may adorn the doctrine of God our Savior in all things. <sup>11</sup>For the grace of God that brings salvation has appeared to all men, <sup>12</sup>teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly in the present age, <sup>13</sup>looking for the blessed hope and glorious appearing of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ, <sup>14</sup>who gave Himself for us, that He might redeem us from every lawless deed and purify for Himself *His* own special people, zealous for good works. <sup>15</sup>Speak these things, exhort, and rebuke with all authority. Let no one despise you. (NKJV)

Titus 1:1–16 <sup>1</sup>Paul, a bondservant of God and an apostle of Jesus Christ, according to the faith of God's elect and the acknowledgment of the truth which accords with godliness, <sup>2</sup>In hope of eternal life which God, who cannot lie, promised before time began, 3but has in due time manifested His word through preaching, which was committed to me according to the commandment of God our Savior; <sup>4</sup>To Titus, a true son in *our* common faith: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ our Savior. <sup>5</sup>For this reason I left you in Crete, that you should set in order the things that are lacking, and appoint elders in every city as I commanded you—<sup>6</sup>if a man is blameless, the husband of one wife, having faithful children not accused of dissipation or insubordination. <sup>7</sup>For a bishop must be blameless, as a steward of God, not self-willed, not quick-tempered, not given to wine, not violent, not greedy for money, <sup>8</sup>but hospitable, a lover of what is good, sober-minded, just, holy, self-controlled, <sup>9</sup>holding fast the faithful word as he has been taught, that he may be able, by sound doctrine, both to exhort and convict those who contradict. <sup>10</sup>For there are many insubordinate, both idle talkers and deceivers, especially those of the circumcision, <sup>11</sup>whose mouths must be stopped, who subvert whole households, teaching things which they ought not, for the sake of dishonest gain. <sup>12</sup>One of them, a prophet of their own, said, "Cretans are always liars, evil beasts, lazy gluttons." <sup>13</sup>This testimony is true. Therefore rebuke them sharply, that they may be sound in the faith, <sup>14</sup>not giving heed to Jewish fables and commandments of men who turn from the truth. <sup>15</sup>To the pure all things are pure, but to those who are defiled and unbelieving nothing is pure; but even their mind and conscience are defiled. <sup>16</sup>They profess to know God, but in works they deny *Him*, being abominable, disobedient, and disqualified for every good work. (NKJV)

Titus 2:1-15 <sup>1</sup>But as for you, speak the things which are proper for sound doctrine: <sup>2</sup>that the older men be sober, reverent, temperate, sound in faith, in love, in patience: 3the older women likewise, that they be reverent in behavior, not slanderers, not given to much wine, teachers of good things—4that they admonish the young women to love their husbands, to love their children, 5to be discreet, chaste, homemakers, good, obedient to their own husbands, that the word of God may not be blasphemed. <sup>6</sup>Likewise, exhort the young men to be sober-minded. <sup>7</sup>in all things showing yourself to be a pattern of good works; in doctrine showing integrity, reverence, incorruptibility, <sup>8</sup>sound speech that cannot be condemned, that one who is an opponent may be ashamed, having nothing evil to say of you. <sup>9</sup>Exhort bondservants to be obedient to their own masters, to be well pleasing in all things, not answering back, 10 not pilfering, but showing all good fidelity, that they may adorn the doctrine of God our Savior in all things. <sup>11</sup>For the grace of God that brings salvation has appeared to all men, <sup>12</sup>teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly in the present age, <sup>13</sup>looking for the blessed hope and glorious appearing of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ, <sup>14</sup>who gave Himself for us, that He might redeem us from every lawless deed and purify for Himself *His* own special people, zealous for good works. <sup>15</sup>Speak these things, exhort, and rebuke with all authority. Let no one despise you. (NKJV)
