## **Dump the Thump**

I'm sure it has happened, but I don't think I know of anyone who was converted to Christ or had an errant view corrected by being his over the head with the Bible. Granted, overzealousness when it comes to evangelism and doctrinal accuracy does not generally seem to be a problem in our context. But assuming we, especially church leaders, take the opportunity to engage people with the Word, we need to do so wisely. We can't waste our time with ridiculous and worthless conversations, so avoid those! But when we do engage people on matters that matter in an effort to win them over to the truth, we need to do so, as Paul says, not by being argumentative, but with kindness, patience, gentleness, and longsuffering. We need to engage those who are in the "snare of the devil" with uncompromising reliance on the truth of the Bible, prayer, and a special measure of Spirit-filled grace.
