<u>Introduction:</u> In our contemporary culture thorough righteousness has become passé, old-fashioned and unimportant. However the Bible teaches differently, *Proverbs* 10:28; *Matthew* 25:46; *Leviticus* 11:44 cf. I Peter 1:16.

 - 3. Is your goal in everything holiness? I John 2:6; Hebrews 12:14
