REGENERATE CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

(Part Three – series on Baptist Distinctives)

TEXT: Acts 2:41-47

INTRODUCTION: Adherence to the first distinctive of biblical authority dictates all the others. Especially is this true in the matter of a regenerate church membership. It cannot be denied that the early church admitted only saved people and lived holy lives in the fear of God.

Gradually a corruption in practice paralleled the inroads of false doctrine (e.g., infant baptism). The result was the emergence of a "mixed multitude" in the constituency of the church. With the dubious conversion to Christianity of the Emperor Constantine in 312 A.D., all outward persecution of the church ceased. Christianity became popular. People wanted to "join" the church for the wrong reasons. The tragic consequences of this practice continue to this day, and Baptists need to conscientiously re-examine this historic distinctive.

CONCLUSION: Baptists in America today seem reluctant to emphasize and enforce this distinctive of insisting on only a regenerate church membership. Failure to do so has resulted in a "mixed multitude" of both saved and unsaved people in our churches. Because we espouse a congregational [democratic] form of government, when the unregenerate members outnumber the regenerate, the mind of the Spirit will no longer be discerned in the voice of the local church.
