Series: John Sermon: 13:18-30

- 1. Judas had been with Jesus and the other Disciples for 3 years, yet it was eventually revealed to others that he was not a true believer.
  - A. Given what we know about Judas from John 12:4-6 and Matthew 26:14-16 what might have been his motivation to remain with Jesus and to betray Jesus?
  - B. Money is needed to operate in this world, but a Christian should have a different view of it than those of the world. What lessons can we apply to our lives from the following passages:
    1 Timothy 6:6-10 and Hebrews 13: 5.
- 2. In 1 John 2:19, John mentions others who, like Judas, appeared to be Christians but over time were revealed to not be genuine believers. Look at the context of 1 John 2:19, what doctrinal issues might have led to their departure?

3. Likewise Paul had someone who appeared to be a believer for some time abandon him. Read 2 Timothy 4:10 to find out why.

What does 1 John 2:15 say about those who love the world?

- 4. Given the examples above how might false believers be revealed today?
- 5. Have you ever had someone who appeared to be a Christian, turn their back on both you and Christ due to love of the world or a rejection of the person of Christ? A. No need to mention names, but a couple of people might share their experience and even the sadness or pain that accompanied the loss. B. How would you comfort a young Christian who was currently going through that sort of difficulty?
- 6. In our minds, it would be wonderful to have no difficulties in life, but it is clear that God uses difficulties to reveal and strengthen genuine faith. Read James 1:2-4. How does going through various trials help to strengthen one's faith?
