I. Introduction.

- A. What is the nature of our freedom in Christ?
 - 1. We are free from the bondage of trying to keep the Law for salvation. 1:1-5:12 4:6-7,31 2:16
 - 2. We are liberated from bondage to sin so that we are free to keep God's Law by loving and serving one another. 5:13-6:10 Rom. 6:17-18
 - 3. This new life is empowered by the Holy Spirit Who indwells us. 5:16,18,22-23,25
- **B.** While Scripture presents these truths in perfect proportion, professing Christians fall into the same errors against which Paul warned. 1:9 2:16 Jude 4
- II. Freedom is expressed in love. v. 13
 - A. You have been set free through the gospel of Christ. v. 13a,1
 - 1. You did not liberate yourself. Rom. 8:30 2 Th. 2:13-14
 - 2. God had a purpose in calling you. 1 Th. 4:7
 - 3. Your liberty should be used responsibly. 1 Co. 6:12 8:9 10:23-24
 - B. Don't turn your freedom into an opportunity to indulge fleshly desires. v. 13b,15,19ff
 - 1. Previously Paul warned against fleshly legalistic efforts towards salvation. 3:3 4:23
 - 2. Here *flesh* refers to the sinful desires of fallen human nature. 5:16-21,24 6:8
 - 3. Though we are in Christ, saved by grace and indwelt by the Holy Spirit, our old fleshly nature still fights for control of our lives. v. 17 Rom. 13:14
 - 4. The misunderstanding of Christian liberty can lead to fleshly behavior. 1 Pe. 2:16
 - 5. Don't exchange slavery to the Law for slavery to the flesh. 5:1 2 Pe. 2:19 Jo. 8:34
 - 6. Paul's chief concern here appears to be fleshly behavior in relationships. v. 15,20
 - C. Use your freedom to lovingly serve one another. v. 13c
 - 1. After Paul has told us that we have been set free from serving the Law, he now tells us to serve one another. 4:8-9,25
 - 2. Such loving service is not merely compelled by Law, but it is brought forth by the Spirit. v. 22,6 2 Co. 5:17 <u>1 Jo. 4:7</u>
 - 3. The gospel sets us free from selfishness and empowers us to love. 2:20 1 Jo. 4:19 Phil. 2:3-8 Mark 10:43-45

III. Lovingly serve one another because love fulfills God's Law. v. 14

- A. After nearly five chapters of speaking of the Law in a negative way, now Paul speaks positively of God's Law.
 - 1. There is nothing bad about God's Law. Ro. 7:12
 - 2. Paul warned against the misuse of the Law. 2:16,19 3:10,17-18,21 4:21 5:3-4
- B. What is the proper use of God's Law?
 - 1. The Law reveals our need of grace for justification. 3:24 2:16
 - 2. We are saved because Jesus fulfilled God's Law. Mt. 5:17
 - a. Jesus kept the Law perfectly for us. Heb. 4:15 7:26 1 Jo. 3:5 1 Pe. 2:22
 - b. Jesus satisfies the righteous demands of the Law by enduring its curse for us.
 3:10,13 Rom. 8:1-4 2 Co. 5:21
 - 3. God's Law reveals how we who have been saved by grace can express our love to Him through our obedience. John 14:15 1 Jo. 2:3-4 <u>Ti. 2:14</u> Eph. 1:4 Jer. 31:33

- C. Love is the fulfillment of the Law.
 - 1. The Law is summarized in the commandment to love. 6:2 <u>Rom. 13:8-10</u> <u>Mt. 7:12</u> Js. 2:8 John 13:34-35 Luke 10:25ff
 - 2. Why doesn't Paul bring up the greatest commandment, to love God? Mt. 22:34ff <u>1 John 4:20-21</u>
 - 3. Legalists focus on certain fine points of the Law, while missing its true significance.
 - 4. How does our motive for keeping God's Law differ from that of the legalists?
- D. Does the Law teach that you should love yourself? Lev. 19:18 2 Tim. 3:2 Eph. 5:28
- E. Whom are you to love? 6:10 Luke 10:29ff Mt. 5:43ff
- IV. To bite and devour one another is fleshly and contrary to gospel love. v. 15
 - A. Do such conflicts actually take place among Christians? Js. 4:1-2
 - B. Harsh words spoken in judgmental self-righteousness destroy. Pr. 11:9a 17:14 20:3
 - C. Instead we should speak gently and build one another up. 6:1-2 Pr. 15:1 Eph. 4:29
 - D. Walk in the Spirit, remembering God's grace to you, then you will love from the heart and your speech and actions will be transformed. Col. 3:12-15 Eph. 4:1ff
- V. Concluding applications. 1 Th. 3:12-13
 - A. How can we grow in love?
 - B. Our love is founded upon God's love for us in Christ. 2:20 1 Jo. 4:19 Phil. 2:3-8 Mark 10:45 John 13:35,13-15
