## Joshua 1:1-5 JEHOVAH COMMISSIONS JOSHUA CONCERNING CANAAN

- I. The promised land.
  - A. God had promised to give Abraham and his seed the land of Canaan (Gen. 12:7).
  - B. Now Jehovah declares that He is ready to make good His promise to "give to them" (2; Deut. 9:1-5).
  - C. Note that the boundaries listed in verse 4 are the ideal boundaries reached under Joshua (11:23; 21:43,45).
  - D. The land of Canaan was a type of final salvation in Jesus Christ, of our eternal inheritance in the new heavens and earth.
- II. That the land was a gift did not mean the people would possess it effortlessly.
  - A. The land of Canaan was not vacant, simply waiting to be possessed, but was occupied.
  - B. Joshua and Israel would have to go into the land ("your foot shall tread upon") and fight against the.
    - 1. Jordan must be crossed, battles fought, and cities captured before they would enjoy their inheritance.
    - 2. The possession of the land would be a consequence of their faith, not their fighting.
  - C. There is beautiful harmony of God's gracious giving of the land and their going over Jordan and fighting enemies.
    - 1. There is nothing contradictory between God's gift and Israel's efforts because He is the One Who gives them the desire and the ability to perform the efforts.
    - 2. So Joshua is commanded to arise and go over Jordan, he and all the people of Israel.
- III. God's assuring promises.
  - A. "There shall not any man be able to stand before thee all the days of thy life."
  - B. "As I was with Moses, so I will be with thee." God unfailing presence.
  - C. "I will not fail thee, nor forsake thee." (cf. Heb. 13:5b,6).
  - D. This is recorded for our sake also.
