Ezekiel Part 7 (Ezekiel 6:8-7:27)

- 1. With God's judgment also came a promise of mercy. (Ezekiel 6:8-10)
- 2. God vowed to spare some of His chosen people. All Israelites would not be destroyed, for some would escape the sword when Israel would be dispersed among the nations.
- 3. Ezekiel reminds the people of the grace of God in sparing a remnant, a topic that he had illustrated when he put some of the shaved hair in the hem of his garment. (Ezekiel 5:1–3)
- 4. That a remnant of faithful people would be spared was part of the covenant promise. (Leviticus 26:40–46)
- 5. The impending defeat of Judah by Babylon did not signal the end of God's covenant promise to Israel. God was not turning away from His promises.
- 6. Some Israelites in captivity would remember God. They would call to mind His character—how He grieved for them in their idolatry.
- 7. The words "their adulterous hearts" refer to their idol-worship unfaithfulness as terrible as a spouse's unfaithfulness in adultery. (Ezekiel 7:20 and 6:13)
- 8. Notice the three forms of judgment mentioned in verse 11 and 12 they are repeated from Ezekiel 5:1–3, 12.
- 9. The three forms of judgment are restated in v. 12 with the message that judgment will be all-inclusive and therefore inescapable.
- 10. No identification has been made of Diblah, which appears in Scripture only in v. 14.
- 11. This probably was a reference to Riblah, which is not mentioned elsewhere in the book but was a border city in the time of Ezekiel.
- 12. Notice the phrase, "they will know that I am the LORD" in verse 14.
- 13. This phrase was used throughout the message of Ezekiel 6 (vv. 7, 10, 13–14).
- 14. The point, of course, was that people will know Him either through their response of obedience or through judgment.
- 15. God's preference, as that of the prophets, was the former.
- 16. What God's people did in Ezekiel's day and we do in ours is because of what drives our affections. (Ephesians 2:1-7)
- 17. As a matter of fact God made a provision so Israel would not forget Him. (Numbers 15:37-41)

- 18. Ezekiel 7 contains a summary message of chapters 4-6. There are six parts to this summary message.
- 19. First, God's determination to bring judgment is announced. (7:1–4)
- 20. Second is the repeated call for judgment to come. (7:5–9)
- 21. Third, the imminence and certainty of judgment is announced. (7:10–13)
- 22. Fourth, the total destruction of the nation is announced. (7:14–18)
- 23. Fifth, the uselessness of all physical resources is declared. (7:19–22)
- 24. Sixth, the fall of Jerusalem is announced. (7:23–27)
- 25. Judah's disobedience will not only cost many of them their lives but will also cost the next generation their land.
- 26. They will not be able to buy their way out of the judgment and no one will be exempt.
- 27. God's wrath will be in exact proportion to the sin His people have committed. (Psalm 33:10-11)
