The Hidden Treasure and The Pearl of Great Price

Matthew 13:44-46 Study Notes for March 18, 2018

I. Introduction

- A. The Call of Christianity (cf. Lk. 9:23; Mt. 6:19-21)
- B. The Parables of our Lord all revolve around "The Kingdom of God" (cf. Mt. 13:24; 20:1)...
 - 1. What is the kingdom of heaven/God?
 - 2. Answer
 - a. "The kingdom of heaven" and its synonymous phrase, "the kingdom of God," refer to the reign and rule of Christ. Thus when we read that "the kingdom of heaven is like..." what we learn is something about the nature of the reign and rule of God either in heaven or on the earth.
 - b. In this regard, the Kingdom of God can have three time references...
- II. The Parables of our Lord, Mt. 13:44-46.
 - A. The Parable of the Hidden Treasure, v. 44.
 - V. 44a: The Buried Treasure
 - 1. Palestine had few banks
 - 2. Palestine was the Battleground of the Near East (cf. Mt. 25:25).

Josephus wrote, "The gold and silver and the rest of that most precious furniture which the Jews had and which the owners treasured underground was done to withstand the fortunes of war."

R. T. France wrote, "Before banking was generally established [in Palestine], to hide wealth in the form of coins, metals or jewels in a jar or box in the ground was a recognized way of securing it, especially in times of crisis; the famous Copper Scroll from Qumran Cave 3 lists the locations of huge caches of precious metals and other buried treasure..." (The Gospel of Matthew. NICNT, explanation added, p. 540)

Joachim Jeremias wrote, "The key-words are rather 'in his joy' (v. 44; they are not expressly repeated in the case of the merchant, but they apply to him as well). When that great joy, beyond all measure, seizes a man, it carries him away, penetrates his inmost being, subjugates his mind. All else seems valueless compared with that surpassing worth; no price is too high, and the unreserved surrender of what is most valuable becomes a matter of course. The decisive thing in the double parable is not what the two men give up, but the reason for their doing so: the overwhelming experience of the greatness of their discovery. So it is with the Kingdom of God. The effect of the joyful news is overpowering; it fills the heart with gladness, making life's whole aim the consummation of the divine community, and producing the most whole-hearted self-sacrifice." (*Rediscovering the Parables*, p. 158)
