How to Live in the Last Days

Paul's Second Letter to the Church at Thessalonica

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God's Main Point in 2 Thessalonians 2:1-12

Christians—those who love the truth of the gospel—will not experience the judgment that will fall on the gospel-rejecting world when Jesus comes. But, until he comes, we should expect intensifying (even horrific) opposition.

Explaining & Applying

2 Thessalonians 2:1–12

- 1. Paul confronts the church's major error—they imagined that they were experiencing God's judgment. But Christians will never experience the judgment of "the day of the Lord" (verses 1–2).
- 2. Paul teaches that the church will experience increasing opposition before Jesus comes. But don't fear it at all (verses 3–9).
- 3. Paul emphasizes the only two responses of people to the gospel of Jesus—you either *love* it or you *delight* in being your own authority (verses 10-12).

Challenges in Interpreting

1. What is the length of "the day of the Lord"? (verses 1-2)

- (a) less than 1 year

2. What is "the rebellion"? (verse 3)

Challenges in Interpreting

2 Thessalonians 2:1–12

- 1. Not every passage in the Bible is this difficult.
- 2. In these four tough interpretations, it's okay if you decide on one, and it's okay if you don't
- 3. The fact that some of the details are fuzzy doesn't mean that the main ideas are fuzzy.
