•	True Christians possess God's which is revealed in their godly behavior.
	<u>James 3.13</u> Who is wise and understanding among you? By his good conduct let him show his works in the meekness of wisdom.
	<u>James 3.17–18</u> But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, open to reason, full of mercy and good fruits, impartial and sincere. 18 And a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace by those who make peace.

	<u>James 5.1–3</u> Come now, you rich , weep and howl for the miseries that are coming upon you. 2 Your riches have rotted and your garments are moth-eaten. 3 Your gold and silver have corroded, and their corrosion will be evidence against you and will eat your flesh like fire. You have laid up treasure in the last days.

0	A true Christian shows a pattern of good works that, when taken, gives good evidence that they are a true Christian.
	. Confusing good works as the root of our salvation instead of the fruit of our alvation will us from having assurance.
