



III. God Deals with Abraham's Descendants C. With Joseph: The Family Reunion (Gen. 42 – 47) "The Scriptures frequently indicate that God effects His program in ways man little understands or recognizes at the time.

Joseph's being sold into Egypt, the following distressing years of famine, and the resulting visits by his brothers in search of food, which we now consider, all served to bring about the descent of Jacob's family to Egypt and the consequent sojourn there where its number would increase to the size of a nation.

It was no doubt difficult at the time to see the good in these respective developments, but God saw them working together to bring about His plan for Israel (Gen. 45:7-8)."



III. God Deals with Abraham's Descendants C. With Joseph: The Blessings (Gen. 48 – 49)

Nearing the end of Jacob's life, he bestows his blessings on two of his grandsons – Ephraim and Manasseh – Joseph's son, as recorded in chapter 48.

"The two were later to become heads of two of Israel's tribes. Joseph did not become a head, but these two sons did.



There was need for this, if the total number of tribes was to be twelve, because God had in mind to employ the descendants of Levi as priests for the tribes. This chapter shows that Jacob now formally adopted Ephraim and Manasseh as two more sons, thus to have parallel rights of inheritance along with his direct sons."



"Often the children of a great man are not recognized for their own greatness because they are so easily compared to the strength of their father. Perhaps that is one of the reason few Christians seem to recognize the true greatness of **Isaac.**

The high character of this man is hinted at in the New Testament when Isaac is not only identified by name as a patriarch of faith but also as a type of Christ (Heb. 11:17-20)...But because Isaac was only a main and Scriptures records his life accurately, we know also that as great as Isaac was, he too stumbled at times in his pilgrimage of faith."

The life of **Joseph** was instrumental in the growth of the nation of Israel.

"The divine wisdom in Jacob's family moving into Egypt is apparent. Egypt was a country in which his descendants would have to remain a separate, distinct people, for Jacob and his sons were shepherds, and shepherds were an abomination to Egyptians (Gen. 43:32; 46:34). That fact would remain a natural barrier to intermarriage...Further, Egypt afforded excellent living conditions for necessary rapid growth in numbers."
