Mark's Gospel—Jesus' True Identity Reveals the Magnitude of His Sacrifice

10:30 Morning Worship Service:

Mark 2:18-22

A Time to Feast, and a Time to Fast

Jesus Is the Bridegroom of His People.

1. The Bridegroom Has Come to Prepare His Bride (19-20).

2. The People Mistake Jesus for One of the Ushers (18).

3. The Wedding Will Be Soon—We Must Get Ready (21-22)!

Conclusion: Traditions can help us remember important realities, but unfortunately, they can also supplant the very thing(s) they are meant to highlight. Fasting is a God-ordained way of grieving over our sin and sharpening our minds as we seek God's guidance. Feasting is also a means for our benefit that God has appointed to aid our celebration of His many blessings. In this passage of Scripture, we see not only a confusion over which is appropriate in their setting, but more importantly the reality of Jesus' position as the Bridegroom who has the authority to direct which is right and when. How does understanding Jesus as our Bridegroom help us to follow Him in both grief and celebration?

Ecclesiastes 3:1-8

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven:

- a time to be born, and a time to die;
- a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted;
- a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up;
- a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance;
- a time to cast away stones, and a time to gather stones together;
- a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing;
- a time to seek, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to cast away;
- a time to tear, and a time to sew; a time to keep silence, and a time to speak;
- a time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace.

Romans 12:9-15

Let love be genuine. Abhor what is evil; hold fast to what is good. Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor. Do not be slothful in zeal, be fervent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints and seek to show hospitality. Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep.

First Peter 1:3-9

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! According to his great mercy, he has caused us to be born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, who by God's power are being guarded through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. In this you rejoice, though now for a little while, if necessary, you have been grieved by various trials, so that the tested genuineness of your faith—more precious than gold that perishes though it is tested by fire—may be found to result in praise and glory and honor at the revelation of Jesus Christ. Though you have not seen him, you love him. Though you do not now see him, you believe in him and rejoice with joy that is inexpressible and filled with glory, obtaining the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls.

Taking Gathered Worship Home

What does it mean for Jesus to be the Bridegroom of His people? When is it appropriate to grieve? When is it time to celebrate? How does the gospel alone provide us unspeakable joy in the midst of grief?

Please use the devotional material below each day this week to praise Christ. Ask Jesus to teach us His ways that we may walk in them to accomplish His purposes.

Sunday Morning

READ Mark 2:18-22; Ecclesiastes 3:1-8, 11a; First Peter 1:3-9; Romans 12:9-15; John 2:1-12; 14:1-7; Psalm 37:1-40. DISCUSS What does it mean that Jesus is the Bridegroom of His people? How is this a claim to divinity? Does that fill you with hope? Why or why not? SERVE someone in need. MEDITATE on John 3:29-30. PRAY "Sweet Beloved of Our Souls, *enflame our hearts with love for You, our Betrothed*. Help us to yearn for Your return. Order all our affections accordingly."

Monday

READ Mark 2:18-22; Ecclesiastes 3:1-8, 11a; First Peter 1:3-9. DISCUSS What was the significance of this moment in redemptive history that those questioning Jesus did not understand? What do we tend to miss in our own moment? How does the gospel lead to joy even in difficulty? SERVE by putting someone else's interests *above your own*! MEDITATE on John 3:29-30. PRAY, "Jesus, forgive us for the many ways our love grows cold. Holy Spirit, help us know how to love Christ as we should and our neighbors as ourselves sharing their joy and grief."

Tuesday

READ Mark 2:18-22; First Peter 1:3-9; Romans 12:9-15. DISCUSS How does the gospel free us to weep and rejoice appropriately? In what ways are you demonstrating this? SERVE by considering someone else's needs *above your own*! MEDITATE on **John 3:29-30**. PRAY, "Jesus, You are the perfect Bridegroom. We love You! Holy Spirit, enable us to grow in that love and make us faithful to Him."

Wednesday

READ Mark 2:18-22; John 2:1-12; Psalm 37:1-40. DISCUSS How did Jesus participate in the wedding in Cana? How does this help us delight in His beauty as our Bridegroom? What is the role of faith as we wait for His return for us? SERVE by *caring about someone else* more than yourself! MEDITATE on John 3:29-30. PRAY, "Beloved, forgive our arrogance and presumption. It is only through Your grace that we are Your Bride. Teach us to walk as befits Your holiness, patience, and love."

Thursday

READ Mark 2:18-22; John 14:1-7; Psalm 37:1-40. DISCUSS Where is Christ now? What is He doing? How does this shape your celebrations and grief? How are you (we) trusting our Bridegroom in our emotions? SERVE by putting someone else's interests *above your own*! MEDITATE on John 3:29-30. PRAY, "Jesus, You know perfectly what is appropriate and when. Holy Spirit, grant us wisdom and discernment so that we might love people more appropriately."

Good Friday

READ Mark 15:6-39; Psalm 22:1-31. Privately confess your sins and grieve the horror that they cost Christ on the cross.

ATTEND the *Good Friday Service at FCCW* tonight at 6:30pm.

PRAY that we at FCCW would be transformed together by God's Word through Mark.

Saturday

PREPARE for Easter Sunday gathered worship tomorrow. READ Mark 16:1-8. Invite others to join you tomorrow for Easter worship services at 7:00 am on Mt Tom and 10:30 at the church building. Ask Jesus to reveal Himself to us in His Word by His Spirit.

Meditate on John 3:29-30
