## **Discussion Questions**

The following questions are designed to be used by parents in discussing the sermon with their children, but can be used by anyone in discussing the sermon with others:

- 1. Deuteronomy was written when the Lord was renewing His covenant with His people. What does this mean?
- 2. What were the signs and wonders that Israel had seen? In spite of these signs and wonders, most of Israel was not committed in their hearts to the Lord. Why not?
- 3. What was the Lord's most fundamental promise to His people? See verses 12-13. What does this mean?
- 4. Of what did the Lord warn Israel in verses 16-28? What does this mean?
- 5. What does this passage teach us about God?

## Going Deeper:

These questions are designed for the believer to use in prayer with his/her Lord, and in discussion with brothers and sisters in the Lord:

- 1. Israel was to keep the covenant because of what the Lord had done in redeeming them out of Egypt and bringing them to the land He had promised. To what is the Christian to look back for motivation to follow Christ? What difference do you think it would make if you look back at these things more frequently and with fuller understanding?
- 2. How does the Lord's promise in verse 13 relate to the Christian? Explain.
- 3. What is the "root bearing poisonous and bitter fruit" (verse 18)? How does it relate to the message of Hebrews? See Hebrews 12:15 and consider its context.
- 4. What does verse 29 mean?
- 5. How does this chapter relate to the gospel?
- 6. How should you apply this message to your life this week?
