## The Epilogue

Job humbles himself before God. (42:1–6)

- 42:5. Job's wish granted (cf. Job 19:25–27).
- 42:6. Job's response? "Repent in dust and ashes."

"Repent" (*nacham*) possible definitions:

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Nacham in the book of Job. (2:11; 7:13; 16:2; 21:34; 29:25)

God restores Job. (42:7–16)

- God restores Job's \_\_\_\_\_\_ status. (7–9)
- God restores Job's \_\_\_\_\_\_ status. (10–11)
- God restored Job's \_\_\_\_\_\_ status. (12–16)

# Lessons from the Book of Job

- 1. God is in control of our trials (Job 1–2)
- 2. Grief is not sin (Job 1–3)
- 3. You cannot assume you know what God is doing in someone's life.
- 4. Wisdom is found deep in the person of God. (Job 28)
- 5. Just because you say truth does not mean you are saying it the right way.
- 6. God's *function* in our trials is not to help us escape them, but to help us through them.
- 7. Sometimes, God may not *feel* very present. This does not mean that He has abandoned you.
- 8. You may never know *why* things have happened to you. However, this does not mean that there is not a plan. God knows what he is doing.
- 9. Our aim should be to bring glory to God through our trials.
