OUTSIDERS

Hebrews 13:13

INTRODUCTION

- As humans, we all have a natural tendency to conform ourselves to the wider majority group of society
- Conformity is motivated by the need to be liked, and have the approval of others
- The Scriptures appropriately liken us to sheep animals that are gregarious, prone to go astray, require guidance and protection, and tend to follow the flock
- Our tendency to follow the flock of humanity becomes a problem when most of humanity is going the wrong way (Ephesians 2:1-3; Matthew 7:13-14)
- Picture a wide road full of people, all heading in one direction, and at the end of that road is a cliff that drops into a fiery pit that is the situation of mankind
- The world is constantly working to conform us to its thinking and ways
- It is only by the grace of God that any of us can be delivered from joining the herd in their descent to hell
- The Christian is now commanded to "be not conformed to this world" (Romans 12:2)
- Paul wrote the epistle to the Hebrews to encourage and exhort Jewish believers who were suffering for their allegiance to Jesus Christ
- There was a cost for a Jew to believe in Christ shunning by the community, expulsion from the synagogue, loss of employment, and many other consequences
- For some, there was the temptation to give up on Christ, and go back to Judaism, thereby avoiding hardship
- Hebrews demonstrates the folly of such a thought, showing how much better Christ is
- There are a number of exhortations throughout Hebrews, and a recurring expression, found 13 times, is "Let us"
- v.13 is a reminder of the Biblical truth that the Christian life is not an easy, comfortable path
- It refutes much of modern Christianity and evangelism that promotes a popular, inoffensive and shallow "gospel" that omits the heinousness of sin, he need of repentance, the taking up the cross, and the shame and reproach of the world
- Being a Christian is to trust in Christ's atonement for salvation
 - ✓ It is to be born again by the Spirit of God
 - ✓ It is to be yielded to Christ as your Lord
 - ✓ It is to follow Christ in all things
 - It is to be identified with Christ and his sufferings

I. LET US FORSAKE THE WORLD

- A. From the beginning, God has called his people to be separated from the world unto himself
 - 1. Enoch (Genesis 5:24)
 - 2. Noah (Genesis 7:1)
 - 3. Abraham (Genesis 12:1)
 - 4. Moses (Hebrews 11:24-27)
 - 5. The nation of Israel (Deuteronomy 7:6)
 - 6. The church (1 Peter 2:9)
 - 7. All believers (2 Corinthians 6:17-18)
- B. "Without (outside) the camp"
 - 1. The camp is an allusion to the tribes of Israel in the wilderness, camped around the tabernacle
 - 2. For the Jewish believers, the camp refers to the Levitical sacrifices and rites, centred in the temple at Jerusalem
 - a. To believe and follow Christ is to leave all those shadows and types behind, and embrace Christ only, who is the fulfilment of them
 - b. Those who remain trusting in the rites and sacrifices of the law exclude themselves from having an interest in Christ
 - c. The Christian's altar is not in Jerusalem or any other earthly place, but is Christ himself, the one sacrifice for sins forever (Hebrews 13:10)
 - d. The bodies of the animals were burned without the camp (Exodus 29:14; Leviticus 4:11-12, 21; 16:27)
 - e. In the same way, Christ did not offer himself within the city of Jerusalem, but "suffered without the gate" (Hebrews 13:12)
 - 3. Generally, the camp signifies all false, anti-christ religions, and the world system itself, which is under the control of Mystery Babylon (Revelation 17)
 - 4. This is a clear call to forsake all other beliefs, hopes, idols, loves, indeed, everything else, to follow and serve Jesus Christ alone (Matthew 6:24; Luke 14:26,33)

II. LET US FOLLOW THE LORD

- A. It is not enough to only leave the camp of error and sin
 - 1. Many people today are waking up to the lies of media and governments, and see the need to come out of this wicked system

- 2. But they are not coming to Christ
- 3. Others separate from evil outwardly, but in their hearts they long to return
 - a. Lot's wife (Genesis 19:26)
 - b. Israel in the wilderness lusting for Egypt (Numbers 11:4-6)
 - c. Eventually such hypocrites will apostatise and return to the world, as the dog returns to its vomit (2 Peter 2:22)
- 4. Some are like the Laodiceans, with the mere form of godliness, yet Christ has no place in their religion (Revelation 3:17)
- C. We must both leave sin and the world, and flee to Jesus Christ
 - 1. He graciously invites the sin-burdened to come unto him for rest (Matthew 11:28-30)
 - 2. Christ gathers his people unto himself as his possession, under his protection and leadership (Genesis 49:10; Matthew 23:37; John 10:16; 12:32)
- D. To be a Christian is to be identified with Christ
 - 1. The Christian publicly confesses Christ as his Lord (Romans 10:9-10)
 - 2. In baptism, we "put on Christ" (Galatians 3:27)
 - 3. The early believers were dubbed "Christians" for their allegiance to Christ (Acts 11:26)

III. LET US FELLOWSHIP IN HIS REPROACH

- A. Christ formed a lonely figure on his procession to Golgotha
 - 1. The crowds that formerly followed him, now disowned him
 - 2. Even his disciples forsook him
 - 3. When there is a cost to following Christ, few are willing to own him (cf. 2 Timothy 1:15-18)
- B. The Christian is called to suffer with Christ, even as he suffered
 - 1. He suffered verbal insults and slander, so must we
 - 2. He suffered physical violence, so must we
 - 3. He suffered rejection by his own people, so must we
 - 4. He suffered loss of property, so must we
 - 5. He suffered unjust legal process, so must we
 - 6. He suffered public humiliation, so must we

- C. We are promised suffering as Christians (2 Timothy 3:12; Acts 14:22; Philippians 1:29)
- D. It is a special privilege of the believer to suffer with Christ
 - 1. Paul's desire was to know Christ and "the fellowship of his sufferings, being made conformable unto his death" (Philippians 3:10)
 - 2. The apostles rejoiced, "that they were counted worthy to suffer shame for his name" (Acts 5:41)
 - 3. As the believer is persecuted, it is Christ who is being persecuted with him (Acts 9:4)
- E. Those who bear the cross will wear the crown
 - 1. "If we suffer, we shall also reign with him: if we deny him, he also will deny us" (2 Timothy 2:12)
 - 2. The believer here has "no continuing city, but we seek one to come" (Hebrews 13:14)
 - Moses chose "rather to suffer affliction with the people of God, than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season; Esteeming the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures in Egypt: for he had respect unto the recompense of the reward." (Hebrews 11:25-26)
- F. As we suffer, we are to do so:
 - 1. Willingly, not begrudgingly
 - 2. Joyfully, not miserably
 - 3. Boldly, not fearfully
 - 4. Patiently, not impatiently

CONCLUSION

- 1. Just as few were willing to accompany Jesus on the *Via Dolorosa*, so relatively few today are willing to stand with the despised and rejected Redeemer, bearing the reproaches of the world
- 2. Christians should be the ultimate non-conformists, refusing to follow the course of this wicked world, regardless of the cost
- 3. Christ calls his people out of Babylon, from her sins, and from her plagues (Revelation 18:4)
- 4. Will you resolve to go forth unto Jesus Christ, bearing the reproaches of the world, for his name and glory?
