- I. Jesus is restoring the Temple
 - A. He has already "cleansed" it
 - B. He is now restoring it
 - C. This means loss for its leaders ("chief priests, scribes, principal men of the people," 19:47; "chief priests, scribes, elders," 20:1)
 - D. They want him dead but are afraid of the crowd (19:48).
- II. The first attack: cast doubt on his authority.
 - A. Questioning Jesus: a play for power
 - B. Authority **the right to say or do something** (see Luke 4:6,32,36; 5:24; 7:8; 9:1; 10:19; 12:5; Acts 26:18)
 - C. What gives Jesus the *right* to disrupt civil and religious order?

 - A. Answering a question with a question
 - B. Where did John the Baptist's authority come from?
 - C. The rulers' dilemma
 - D. Not just a witty put-down
- IV. The authority of Jesus
 - A. The authority of Jesus is a threat to order. (Psalm 2)
 - B. The authority of Jesus does not depend on public opinion.
 - C. The authority of Jesus comes from God.
 - D. The authority of Jesus is something he uses to please God, not man.
 - E. The authority of Jesus means that he does not fear, but loves people. (1 John 4:18)
