## II. The Messianic King, the promised son of David, enters His capital. Psalm 118

- A. The Psalm speaks to multiple situations Moses, David, Jesus and us.
- B. The LORD has delivered His people. v. 1-18
  - 1. Praise the LORD Whose lovingkindness is everlasting. v. 1-4 Jer. 33:11
  - 2. I (the king) called upon the Lord in my distress. v. 5-9
  - 3. The LORD dramatically rescued me. v. 10-14 Ex. 15:2 Ps. 2:2 Acts 4:25-27
  - 4. Praise the LORD for His great works. v. 15-18
- C. The King of glory leads the triumphal procession toward the temple. v. 19-21
  - 1. He comes to offer a sacrifice of thanksgiving to the LORD. v. 19
  - 2. Who is fit to lead God's people into the LORD's holy presence? v. 20 Ps. 24:3-10
  - 3. He comes to bring salvation to His people. v. 21 Gen. 15:6 Heb. 10:19-22 9:24
  - 4. How can we enter God's presence today? John 4:23-24 Heb. 10:25 Eph. 2:21f
- D. How will God's Anointed One be received? v. 22-24
  - 1. The builders reject the stone. v. 22a
    - a. Israel and her king were rejected by the nations. Ps. 2:1ff
    - b. Jesus was rejected by the Jewish leaders. v. 22a Mt. 21:33-42 Luke 20:9-18 Mark 12:1ff John 1:10f 12:19 11:49-53,57 19:15 Acts 4:11 1 Pe. 2:7 Is. 28:13ff
  - 2. The LORD has made the rejected stone His cornerstone. v. 22b-23
    - a. Salvation comes from Israel. Gen. 12:3 John 4:22
    - b. Christ is the Cornerstone. Eph. 2:20 Rom. 9:32 Mt. 21:43-44
  - 3. Even His rejection was part of God's plan. Acts 4:27-28 Luke 24:25-27 Isa. 53:1ff
  - 4. He will be exalted. Phil. 2:9-11
  - 5. Those who reject Him will be crushed. Dan. 2:34-35,44-45 <u>Is. 8:14-15</u> 1 Pe. 2:7-8
- E. Celebrate God's deliverance. v. 24-29 Ex. 15:1ff John 12:12-13 Mt. 21:9
  - 1. This is the day which the LORD has made. Rejoice! v. 24
  - 2. Hosanna (save now) to the king. v. 25
  - 3. Blessed is He Who comes in the name of the Lord. v. 26
  - 4. Give thanks to the LORD. v. 27-29, v. 1
- F. Jesus, by entering Jerusalem in this way, declares that He is the King of Glory and the stone rejected by men. He is also the Passover lamb. 1 Cor. 5:7
- III. The triumphal entry from the perspective of the crowds: curiosity. v. 9, 12-13, 17-18
  - A. A great outpouring of religious enthusiasm.
  - B. They don't fully understand the events in which they participate.
    - 1. They are drawn by the signs Jesus performed. v. 9,17-18 Mt. 16:4
    - 2. They seek an earthly king and deliverer: palms and hosannas. 6:15 Ps. 118:26 2 Sam. 14:4 2 Kn. 6:26 Ps. 92:12 Lev. 23:40
    - 3. Later, they reject Him. Mk. 15:12-15
    - 4. God uses them, in spite of themselves -- the rocks cry out. Mt. 21:15-16 Lu. 19:40
  - C. Many today are like the mobs.

- 1. They seek Jesus for what He can do for them: signs and wonders.
- 2. They are obsessed with earthly things. 1 Jo. 2:15-17 1 Tim. 6:5,10 Rom. 14:17
- 3. They follow "messiahs" who promise earthly success and prosperity. 2 Tim. 4:3-4
- 4. They claim spiritual experiences, but lack spiritual reality. Mt. 7:21-23 13:1-15
- 5. When they face the cost of discipleship, they flee. v. 25 John 6:66 Mark 8:34ff
- 6. Jesus weeps over the unbelief in Israel. Luke 19:41-44

## IV. The triumphal entry from the perspective of the Lord Jesus: the cross before the crown. v. 14-16

- A. He openly allows Himself to be declared the Messianic King. v. 13
  - 1. Previously He had restrained the crowds who wanted to exalt Him. 6:15
  - 2. Now He is ready to receive their adulation. v. 23 Luke 19:39-40
  - 3. He consciously and deliberately acts in the fulfillment of prophecy. 12:14 Ps. 118:26 Zech. 9:9 Gen. 17:6 49:10 Luke 1:30-33 Mt. 21:1-6
- B. He demonstrates what kind of King He is. v. 14-15 1 Ki. 1:33,38
  - 1. He is not a conquering warrior King riding on a horse. Jer. 8:6 Rev. 6:4
  - 2. He comes in peace and humility on a donkey. Zec. 9:9-10 Gen. 49:9-11 Mic. 4
  - 3. He brings peace to the world. v. 19-20,32 11:52 3:16 Zech. 9:10 Ps. 72:8 Isa. 9:6
  - 4. His mission of peace is accomplished only by way of the humiliation of the cross. v. 24 Zech. 9:9,11 13:1 Mark 10:45 Mt. 26:27-28
  - 5. He conquers mightier enemies than Rome: sin and death. Rom. 5:1 Heb. 2:14-17
- C. At this time, only Jesus fully understands the nature of His kingdom. v. 16 2:22 14:26
  - 1. He realizes that He will only receive His crown through the cross. v. 23-24
  - 2. This scene is a glorious inbreaking of the kingdom which is yet to come. Is. 40:9-11
  - 3. The disciples only understand these events after He has ascended.
  - 4. Many today still don't grasp the spiritual nature of His kingdom, 18:36 1 Co. 2:14

## V. The triumphal entry from the perspective of Jesus' enemies: murderous envy. v. 9-11,19

- A. The display of His glory provokes them to envious hatred. Lu. 19:39 Mt. 21:15-16
  - 1. They should have sent a delegation out to greet Him and to pay homage. Ps. 2:10ff
  - 2. Instead, they again take counsel together against the Lord and His anointed. v. 10,19 Ps. 2:1ff 118:22 Acts 4:25-26,11
  - 3. They are without excuse. John 12:10-11,37-43
  - 4. We who follow Jesus are subject to the same hatred. v. 10-11 15:18 Ps. 118:6-14
- B. Jesus' coming forebodes disaster for His enemies. Ps. 118:22 Mt. 21:12-44
  - 1. He purges the temple of their corruptions. Mt. 21:12-13
  - 2. He curses the fig tree. Mt. 21:18f
  - 3. The kingdom is about to be given to others. v. 20 3:16-17 Mt. 21:33f
  - 4. Those who reject the Cornerstone will be crushed. Mt. 21:42-46
- C. The world is coming after Him. v. 19-20 3:16 Rev. 5:9 7:9-10
- D. Jesus voluntarily lays down His life for His sheep. v. 23-24 10:11,17
