OPENING

"Who made thee a prince and a judge over us?" (Ex.2:14)

It had been forty years since Moses had slain the Egyptian and then had to escape Egypt to save his own life.

In the meantime, he had married, had children, and then while watching the flock in the "backside of the desert" (Ex. 3:1), he met God at the burning bush and was given a new assignment.



At 80 years old, Moses' new assignment required him leading the nation Israel out of bondage to the Promise Land. It was not going to be easy for him, but it would be rewarding. He was to be "a prince and a judge over" a new nation.

God loves, calls, and stretches out His hand to sinners, and those who do not regard His call are rejected, and those who harken to His call are saved.




