Nehemiah 3, 4:6 SO BUILT WE THE WALL WITH A MIND TO WORK

- I. The description.
 - A. When Babylon destroyed the city, the walls were pushed out. Massive stones rolled down into the valleys below.
 - B. The registry of the wall building in Nehemiah 3 begins with priests and follows a counter-clockwise direction.
 - 1. This is God's registry of faithful church edifiers, which began with the example of priests, including the high priest.
 - 2. Those who worked for the edification of the church were diverse.
 - 3. Note their selflessness. The mindset was that of self-denial.
 - 4. Note the unity of the builders: working "next unto" others. They loved the cause AND each other.
 - 5. Note the zeal of the builders: the Tekoites (5,27) and Meshullam (4,30) repaired two portions of the wall.
 - 6. Note that the sins of family did not disqualify nor make one think he ought not to help.
- II. The building of Jerusalem's walls was a testimony of God's power rather than that of the people.
 - A. The work of the Lord, by the grace of the Spirit, was important to them all.
 - B. The presence of organization and authority is implied in Nehemiah's presence.
 - C. The dominant impression is of each group working cheerfully, willingly accepting their role.
- III. Do you build the wall of Zion, even over against your own house (3:10)?
 - A. Do you do all you can to make sure that what you believe and how you live serves to edify (build up) the body of Christ.
 - B. As we go through this listing the Spirit applies this to us.
 - C. May God give us a mind to work, to build to the best of our ability.
