

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The All Important Circles of Context



Hermeneutical Principles:

- 1. Not all passages of Scripture are equally clear. 2 Peter 3:16
- 2. The Bible should be interpreted according to its literal sense. The natural meaning of a passage is to be interpreted according to the normal rules of grammar, speech (including figures of speech), syntax and grammatical-historical context.
- 3. The Analogy of Faith: The teaching of the whole Bible determines specific interpretations. (Biblical Road Map).
- 4. Analogy of the Scriptures: We should interpret unclear, difficult or ambiguous passages of Scripture by comparison with clear and unambiguous passages that refer to the same teaching or event.
- 5. Didactic (explicit) interprets narrative (both explicit and implicit).
- 6. Theology is done at the concept level not the word level.
- 7. Approach the Bible believing what it says, even before you understand it.
- 8. Christ is the principal end of the whole of Scripture. Luke 24:27
- 9. We are dependent upon the Holy Spirit to illumine our hearts to enable us to believe and understand Scripture. Ephesians 1:17-18, Psalm 119:18,27, Luke 24:45
- 10. Our study should be done with a spirit of humility desiring to love God and neighbor more, recognizing that knowledge without love puffs up.
- 11. Our study should lead us to worship.
