The Promise of Christ's Coming

2 Peter 3:1-7

"In House" Discussion

- ❖ We read God's Word to
 - know God better
 - understand ourselves more clearly and our desperate need for salvation
 - discover the remedy God provides for our sin
 - allow the Holy Spirit to perform spiritual surgery in us as He forms us into the image of Christ
- Peter's previous warnings about false teachers provide the backdrop against which he offers Christ followers positive teaching and exhortation

Biblical Worldview

- ❖ In v. 1, Peter's affection for his reader's is clear
 - calls them *beloved*
 - Peter's heart's desire is to see those he loves in the Lord fully on board with the Lord's purposes for them
- Peter knows no Christ follower is ever so secure in the faith that he/she does not need reminders and exhortations to maintain a Biblical worldview

- Peter warns against the traps and tricks of Satan (the one who prowl around like a roaring lion seeking someone to devour)
- Peter wants to ensure that believers continually cultivate the ability to discern spiritual truth and apply it to their lives
- Two sources that form the foundation of a Biblical worldview

■ the predictions of the holy prophets

- their words continue to have force and relevance for all who become God's children though faith in Jesus
- fuels an eager anticipation and expectation about what is still to come
- essential to Christian growth

■ the commandment of the Lord and Savior

- a shorthand way of summarizing the mission of all who faithfully follow Christ
- Jesus tells us tells us we must be perfect, as our heavenly Father is perfect. (Matt. 5:48)
 - all who submit to Christ and follow the lead of His Holy Spirit, are given a new will that causes them to desire to conform their lives to the will of God
 - living out the many implications of the new commandment Jesus gives in John 13:34-35

A Target of Scoffers

- Living the way God calls, equips and empowers you to live will likely make you a target of scoffers
- ❖ Peter picks out two frequent lines of attack that scoffers take

- to deny that Jesus is coming back in glory
 - Where is the promise of His coming?
 - "the world keeps turning, generations come and go, nothing ever changes"
 - such claims deliberately overlook the spectacular way God intervened in the course of human history through the flood
 - God destroyed the world through water and His Word
 - God will do the same thing again in the future through fire and His Word
 - creation exists because of God's powerful word (Psalm 33:6-7, Hebrews 11:3)
 - God will use His powerful word in the future to destroy the world by fire
- to downplay, disdain, and deny the notion that God is in control of history
 - those who follow Christ must guard themselves against the ways contemporary thoughts abut the history of the world can seep into their thinking
 - believers must maintain a Christian worldview which affirms that God is constantly at work in the unfolding events that mark our lives and our world
 - history does not unfold by "chance"
 - history is not circular nor does it repeat
 - there is a personal God who intervenes in history and shapes people and world events as He sees fit
 - Jesus will return in power and reign in glory
