Three Models to Mirror

I. Like Paul, we must rejoice in sacrifice (2:17-18).

Like Paul, we must <u>rejoice</u> in <u>sacrifice</u> (2:17-18)
 A. Paul <u>sacrificed</u> greatly with them (17a).

From the Jews five times I received forty stripes minus one. Three times I was beaten with rods; once I was stoned; three times I was shipwrecked; a night and a day I have been in the deep; in journeys often, in perils of waters, *in* perils of robbers, *in* perils of *my* own countrymen, in perils of the Gentiles, in perils in the city, in perils in the wilderness, in perils in the sea, in perils among false brethren;

in weariness and toil, in sleeplessness often, in hunger and thirst, in fastings often, in cold and nakedness besides the other things, what comes upon me daily: my deep concern for all the churches.

- III. Like Epaphroditus, we must <u>minister</u> with <u>selflessness</u> (25-30).

Soon after New Testament times, a group of Christians banded together in an association they called the Parabolani, which means "The Gamblers." Taking Epaphroditus as their model, they visited prisoners and ministered to the sick, especially those with dangerous communicable diseases whom no one else would help. They boldly proclaimed the gospel of Jesus Christ wherever they went.

When the city of Carthage, on the Mediterranean coast of North Africa, suffered a severe plague in A.D. 252, the pagan inhabitants were so frightened of contagion that they refused to touch the dead bodies even to bury them. [It was these Christians in the spirit of Epaphroditus who did] the arduous and dangerous task of ministering to the sick and dying and burning the thousands of corpses.
