WCF Ch. 21. 1. The Form of Presbyterian Church Government: The pastor is an ordinary and perpetual officer in the church, prophesying of the time of the gospel. First, it belongs to his office, To pray for and with his flock, as the mouth of the people unto God, Acts 6:2, 3, 4, and 20:36, where preaching and prayer are joined as several parts of the same office. The office of the elder (that is, the pastor) is to pray for the sick, even in private, to which a blessing is especially promised; much more therefore ought he to perform this in the public execution of his office, as a part thereof. To read the scriptures publicly [...] To feed the flock, by preaching of the word, according to which he is to teach, convince, reprove, exhort, and comfort. To catechise, which is a plain laying down the first principles of the oracles of God, or of the doctrine of Christ, and is a part of preaching. To dispense other divine mysteries. To administer the sacraments. To bless the people from God, Numb. 6:23, 24, 25, 26. Compared with Rev. 14:5, (where the same blessings, and persons from whom they come, are expressly mentioned,) Isa. 66:21, where, under the names of Priests and Levites to be continued under the gospel, are meant evangelical pastors, who therefore are by office to bless the people. To take care of the poor. And he hath also a ruling power over the flock as a pastor.
