

Our current age is Biblically called "the present time" (Lk. 18:30; Rom. 8:18; 11:15); "The latter times" (1 Tim. 4:1); "The last days" and "perilous times" (2 Tim. 3:1), "Last times" (1 Pet. 1:20).

Israel is a chosen nation (Deut. 7:6-8; 14:2; Ps. 134:4, Jer. 31:3; Rom. 11:29). They are a covenant people (Gen. 12:1-7; 13:14-17; 15:1-21; 17:1-14; 22:15-18). They are a conflicted nation because they rejected the King and the Kingdom (Matt. 4:12,17; 10:5-7; 11:2-27; 12:43-50; 13:53-16:2, 13-28:20). Therefore Israel is presently "blind" but will be eventually restored (Rom. 11).

God's Kingdom program is currently no longer with Israel for now. It is with "a great mystery: Christ and the church" (Eph. 5:32).

This present age can be called the "Church-Age."

It is called the "Church-Age" because the focus of God's kingdom program is the New Testament Church (or churches) and not Israel.

- 1. The Gospel is to be preached to every creature. (Mk. 16:15; Acts 1:8; 11:18; 13:46-48; 14:27; 15:14-18; 28:25 -28; Gal. 3:13,14)
- 2. The Great Commission is granted exclusively to the church (churches). (Matt. 28:19,20)
- 3. The Ground Plan of God for the churches are exemplified in "the things which are" imperatives & exhortations of Revelations ch. 2 & 3.

The churches are symbolized as candlesticks or light-bearers (Rev. 1:20) and pillar and ground of the truth (1 Tim. 3:15).

<u>Biblical observations about The Last</u> Days:

- A. Our times are perfectly described in the mystery of the kingdom parables of Matt. 13. The Parable of the Sower (13:1-8, 18-23) - various kinds of hearers and various kinds of results. The Parable of the Tares among the Wheat (13:24-30, 36-43) - false believers among true believers. The Parable of the Mustard Seed (13:31-32) - explosive growth of apostate Christianity. The Parable of the Leaven (13:33) - the spread of doctrinal error, formalism, hypocrisy, modernism, worldliness, and political ambition. The Parable of the Treasure Hid in the Field (13:44) - Israel, as God's peculiar treasure, is momentarily hid (or laid aside). The Parable of the Merchant Man (13:45-46) -Jesus laid aside Heaven to obtain the pearl of great price (God's people). The Parable of the Net (13:47-50) - The Gospel net is spread out but the results are mixed (some saved, some unsaved—they will be sorted out). The Parable of the Householder (13:52) - The Christian is to be ready always to give an answer to every man that asks you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear (cf. 1 Pet. 3:15).
- B. Our times are marked by apostasy and wickedness (1 Tim. 4:1-3; 2 Tim. 3:1-8, 13; 2 Pet. 2:1-3; 1 John 2:18-19; read also the entire book of Jude).
- C. God has a blessed hope for all who are saved, born-again, believers, Christians, sons of God, born of God, or "in Christ." He will close out the "Church-Age" at the beginning of Daniel's 70th Week (Dan. 9:24) and refocus on Israel, once more. The Church-Age will close and The Day of the LORD will begin. These future events are ready to take place simultaneously and at any moment.
