1. What is doubt?

		Boy's Father: 'I believe, help my unbelief' (Mark 9:24)	
		John the Baptist – Luke 17:17-23	
•	Doubt is not unbelief, but 'the mind in suspension between faith and unbelief.' (Os Guinness, I Believe in Doubt)		
•	In this fallen world, there is no 'doubtless' faith.		
•	Doubt is serious (it can go toward either faith or unbelief), but it is not terminal (it is not an obvious indication of apostasy).		
2.	W	What might we doubt?	
		The goodness and mercy of God.	
		Our own sinfulness and need for a Savior.	
		The ability and willingness of Jesus to save.	
		The evidence for the resurrection.	
		The reliability of the New Testament.	
		The sufficiency of faith alone.	
3.	W	Why might we doubt?	
		Meeting a moral, happy atheist.	
		Meeting a suffering, faithful believer.	
		Wrestling with the fairness of hell and salvation	
		Encountering a corrupt religious institution.	
		Encountering an apparent contradiction in Scripture.	
		Physical reasons (sleep deprivation)	

	Intellectual reasons (failure to look at the evidence)
	Emotional reasons (negative experiences)
	Moral reasons (desire for sexual freedom, etc)
	Spiritual reasons (discouragements with sin and failure)
4. V	What do we do in response to doubts that people have?
	Have mercy on them. (Jude 1:22)
	Address the issue of 'doubtless faith.' (Mark 9:24)
	Be patient and give them the right to struggle with questions and doubts. (1 Thessalonians 5:14)
	Encourage them to seek answers to their doubts and look hard at the truth and evidence for it. (1 Peter 3:15)
	Encourage them to realize that no one has all his questions answered (ie, live with mystery). (Deuteronomy 29:29)
	Encourage them to realize that no one operates on the basis of 100% certainty.
	Encourage them to realize that science (ie, the scientific method) is not the only source of knowledge.
	Encourage them to seek the answers in the means of grace: Word, prayer and fellowship with believers.
	Encourage them to focus on the main issues. (1 Corinthians 15:3)
	Encourage them to be careful of an unwillingness to deal with sin.
	Encourage them to 'doubt your doubts (don't automatically give more weight to your doubts than you do to your beliefs/convictions).'
	Encourage them to see 'doubt' as a bridge to greater faith.
