Sowing the Seed (2) Luke 8:4-15

A Well-Known Parable

- The parable of the sower is one of Jesus' most well-known and best-loved parables
 - a surprisingly simple story with a very straightforward message but one about which many miss the point
 - in v. 9, even the disciples need to ask Jesus to explain what this parable means
- Jesus ends His story with the somewhat cryptic comment, *He who has ears to hear, let him hear*
 - there is more here "than meets the ear"
 - those who have "ears to hear" ask questions
 - Jesus uses parables to reveal the *secrets of the kingdom* of God to those who are interested in going deeper and plunging into the heart of the gospel message
 - the only people who can understand and benefit from Jesus' style of storytelling are those who are eager to learn truth
 - anyone who truly wants to understand can ask to have his/her mind opened and enlightened
 - with what kind of ears are <u>you</u> listening?

4 Types of Soil

- The farmer in Jesus' story uses the broadcast method of sowing his seed
 - in Jesus' time, a skillful farmer would throw seed as widely and as evenly as possible in order to cover the whole plowed field with no margins on the perimeter left unseeded
 - inevitably, some seed falls in places where the soil isn't ideal
 - only the seed that finds its way into good soil will ever produce a crop worth harvesting
- * v. 5, the hardened footpath
 - seed is trampled underfoot
 - the birds come and eat it
- ***** v. 6, the rock
 - a kind of soil that has a rock bed under the field's surface
 - seed sprouts and initially looks promising and lush
 - when the sun beats down and the water is gone, this crop dies out as quickly as it sprang up
- ✤ v. 7, the weed infested soil that is full of thorns
 - seed sown in a field of weeds will not produce a healthy harvest
 - weeds suck up the soil's moisture and nutrients, block the sun's light, and choke the life out of anything that might be worthwhile

- ***** v. 8, the good soil
 - fertile, fruitful soil in which the seed flourishes
 - the roots go deep and eventually produce an abundant crop
- This parable is NOT about the sower OR the seed, it is about the soil
 - Jesus makes no comment about the sower and his skill (the sower = anyone who disperses God's Word)
 - all the seed comes from the same source
 - v. 11, *The seed is the word of God*
 - the seed is perfect, eternally unchanging
 - the unadulterated Word of God is the only true, legitimate seed
- The plowed field = the human heart
 - v. 12, the devil takes the word away from the <u>heart</u>
 - v. 15, those who hear the word and hold it fast in their <u>hearts</u> are those who produce fruit
- All four soil types consist of the same organic material (minerals, nutrients, access to water, etc...)
 - what sets the four soils apart is their preparedness to receive the good seed of God's Word
 - your response to the Word of God depends of the condition of your heart
 - the production of fruit in your life is the only evidence you have that you have heard, received and rightly reacted to the Word of God

- The first three soils represent unregenerate, unbelieving hearts
 - only the fourth soil type, the good soil, is capable of bearing fruit for God
 - v. 12 tells us that the seed along the path = hearts that are hardened and impervious to the truth (may be like religious leaders of whom Jesus says their father is the devil, John 8:44)
 - v. 13 tells us that the shallow hearted hearers of v. 6 only make a superficial response (Spurgeon: "Great joy often accompanies false conversions.")
 - v. 14, the seed among the thorns in v. 7 gets off to a promising start, but these people are too occupied and too enthralled with worldly matters
- ✤ The first three soils all show promise, but none bear fruit
- Only the good soil... receives the Word and bears fruit, more fruit, much fruit, fruit that will last
 - the mark of authentic faith is endurance
 - temporary faith is not true faith
