XVII. The Power of Righteous Praying

- A. Prayer and Comfort vs 13
 - 1. Practical care for those suffering
 - a. *kakopatheo* to undergo hardship:--be afflicted, endure afflictions (hardness), suffer trouble.
 - b. refers to enduring evil treatment by people, not physical illness 2 Ti 2:9; 4:5
 - c. the antidote Let him pray
 - i. Who are they praying
 - the Father of mercies and God of all comfort 2 Co 1:3
 - casting all your care upon Him, for He cares for you 1Pe 5:7
 - ii. Present Tense indicating continual pleading
 - 2. Practical encouragement for the cheerful
 - a. *euthumeo* to cheer up, be cheerful; more cheerfully:--be of good cheer (merry).
 - i. describes those who are well in spirit or a joyful attitude
 - ii. Not describing the physical aspect
 - b. Let him sing psalms.
 - i. *psallo* to twitch or twang, to play on a stringed instrument (celebrate the divine worship with music and accompanying odes):--make melody, sing (psalms).
 - ii. Verb form of the noun Pslam Eph 5:19; Col 3:16
 - iii. Praise is a one aspect of prayer
 - 3. The suffering and the happy are both to pray
 - a. the sufferer is to plead to God
 - b. The joyful is to praise the Lord
- B. Prayer and Restoration vs 14-15
 - 1. sick
 - a. *astheneo* to be feeble (in any sense):--be diseased, impotent folk (man), (be) sick, (be, be made) weak.
 - i. used 35 times in NT
 - ii. Translated 18 times as sick Mt 10:8; 25:36, 39; Mk 6:56; Lk 4:40; Jo 4:46
 - iii. 14 times used for emotional or spiritual weakness Ac 20:35; Ro 4:19; 8:3
 - iv. In the epistles all but 3 refer to other than physical illness
 - v. James does have a tendency to follow Matthew
 - vi. Using weak here instead of sick would make sense in the context of suffering believers spoken of in 5:7-11
 - b. Suffering can bring one to the point of giving up, not able to help themselves
 - 2. Let him call for the elders of the church
 - a. *proskaleomai* to call toward oneself, i.e. summon, invite:--call (for, to, unto).
 - b. let them pray over him
 - i. A primary ministry of Elders
 - ii. Acts 6:4 "but we will give ourselves continually to prayer and to the ministry of the word."
 - c. anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord
 - i. aleipho oil (with perfume):--anoint.

- ii. Not used in NT of ceremonial anointing
 - to rub as in medical treatment
 - treatment for injuries received from persecution Lu 10:34 the good Samaritan
 - the rubbing would stimulate blood flow increasing the bodies ability to recover or heal
- iii. The Elders were to stimulate, encourage, strengthen, and refresh the suffering brother
- iv. in the name of the Lord true biblical encouragement is consistent with who God is
- 3. The result
 - a. the prayer of faith will save the sick,
 - i. *sozo* to save, deliver or protect:--heal, preserve, save (self), do well, be **(make) whole**.
 - ii. kamno to toil, to tire:--faint, sick, be wearied Heb 12:3
 - b. the Lord will raise him up.
 - i. *egeiro* to waken, rouse (from sleep, from sitting or lying, from disease, from death; from obscurity, inactivity, ruins, nonexistence):--awake, lift (up), raise (again, up), rear up, (a-)rise (again, up), stand, take up.
 - ii. God uses the ministry of the elders to restore this person to viability and service again
- 4. And if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven.
 - a. sin also brings spiritual defeat
 - b. if the spiritual weakness comes do to sin, confession is God's answer 1 Jo
 - 1:9; Ps 32:5; Pr 28:13
- C. Prayer and Fellowship vs 16a
 - 1. Confess your trespasses to one another, pray for one another,
 - a. instead of waiting until sin drags one into spiritual defeat
 - b. confess
 - i. exomologeo to acknowledge or agree fully:--confess, profess, promise.
 - ii. Present active indicative confessing continually
 - iii. To expose and deal with, with the help of a loving fellowship
 - 2. that you may be healed.
 - a. *iaomai* to cure:--heal, make whole.
 - b. again, not necessarily physical, also refers to spiritual restoration
- D. Prayer and Power vs 16b-18
 - 1. The effective, fervent prayer of a righteous man avails much.
 - a. effective, fervent *energeo* to be active, efficient:--do, (be) effectual (fervent), be mighty in, shew forth self, work (effectually in). Pr 15:8; 28:9
 - b. avails much lit. is very strong
 - 2. The illustration of Elijah
 - a. Elijah was a man with a nature like ours,
 - i. hungered 1 Kgs 17:11
 - ii. feared 1 Kgs 19:3
 - iii. Suffered from depression 1 Kgs 19:3, 9-14 lends credence to the healing in view in this passage
 - b. and he prayed earnestly that it would not rain;
 - i. and it did not rain on the land for three years and six months.
 - ii. And he prayed again, and the heaven gave rain, and the earth produced its fruit again, a spiritual blessing on a land devastated by sin
