The Ultimate Vine Abiding in Christ (Dr. James Rosscup. 2005) John 15:1 Reading: Ephesians 1:15-23

Let's begin w/ a very short & simple word association exercise...

I'll say a word & you say another word it brings to mind...(ready?)... "true!"

Did anyone say "false"? Did anyone say "real"?

Turn w/ me and let's read Jesus' "Vine & Branches" allegory from John 15:1-11

Again, this is an *allegory*, which means its images are familiar and they are given to *teach a lesson*.

Tonight we want to briefly *review* the main points of the text, then focus on the *very beginning* of Jesus' illustration:

The vine & the branches & NT believers

- 1. What was Jesus' main point, the big idea in this illustration?
- 2. We'll soon see that Jesus' main truths concerned *union*, *communion* & *fruitfulness*.
 - a. *Union*. The union between Christ and His people because they are with Him and in Him (Eph 2!) This union is simply true; it is a theological, positional reality for each true believer. It is the union that sees us as crucified & raised & seated & living w/ our Lord.
 - b. *Communion*. *Communion* is our *experience* of the theological truth of *union*.
 - c. *Fruitfulness*. Bearing *fruit* is a big deal in John 15! Being Jesus' branch means bearing Jesus' *fruit*!

- 3. You might also say Jesus' word picture is a *story* w/*characters*:
 - a. **Jesus** (vine source of the godly life; power to bear righteous fruit).
 - i. We've come to the final example in the Gospel of John of Jesus' seven "I Am" declarations: I am the bread of life, I am the light of the world, I am the door of the sheep, I am the good shepherd, I am the resurrection and the life, I am the way & the truth & the life; ...I am the true vine!
 - b. *God* (*vinedresser* who evaluates & tends the branches, including pruning & disposing).
 - c. *Jesus' disciples* (incl. *us fruit bearers*). The *fruit* of new disciples; the *fruit* of Christ-like character
 - d. Some would even say the *Holy Spirit* is a *clearly* implied & *essential* character...
- 4. We also noted the likelihood that Jesus was reaching back into the **OT** where the *vine* was a symbol of *Israel*.

With that brief review, let's now focus our attention on the very beginning of our text this evening. And I mean the very beginning!

- 1. Jesus said: "*I am the true vine*…" Perhaps you were already familiar w/ this chapter, but have you ever wondered why Jesus emphasized that He is the *true vine*?
- 2. Let's start w/ a simple *word study*: the Gr word we translate here as *true* is *alethinos* (adj).
 - a. "alethinos" can be understood as genuine or real (vs. false).
 - i. Like a real coin vs. a counterfeit coin.
 - ii. Or a *genuine Rembrandt* as opposed to a *copy*.

- b. "alethinos" can also communicate the idea of ultimate, often in spiritual contexts.
 - i. Like the *ultimate* realization of a symbol.
 - ii. **E.g.** ...
 - 1. God fed Israel w/ *manna*. Jesus claimed to be the *true bread* which came down out of heaven.
 - 2. God prescribed a *spotless lamb* as an atoning sacrifice. Jesus was the *Lamb of God*, who takes away the sin of the world.
 - 3. *Light* is a frequent symbol of *truth*. John's Gospel begins by referring to Christ as the *true light*; Jesus identified Himself as the *light of the world* (Jn 8).
 - iii. In every example, the *original* reference is *good*, but Jesus is the *ultimate*, the *best*.
 - 1. *Manna* was good, Jesus is the *ultimate bread*.
 - 2. The *Passover Lamb* was good; Jesus alone takes away the sin of the world.
 - 3. *Light* is good, Jesus is the embodiment of *light* or *truth*; in His own words: "He is the *way the truth the life*."
- 3. Here (Jn 15) Jesus declares that He is the "true vine." Certainly it is fair to say that His allegory suggests *natural vines*, but as we suggested last week, the *vine* was also an **OT** type of *Israel*.

- 4. God often used *nature* to suggest *spiritual truth* and we can see that here.
 - a. Certainly the *vine* is a picture of *fruitfulness*, but it's also one of *union* (in fact, *union* is one of the *illustration*'s main ideas).
 - i. Where does a *vine* **end** & a *branch* **begin**...?
 - ii. My point is that Jesus is an *individual* yet He is also (as *vine*) all of those in *union* w/ Him.
 - iii. Hudson Taylor (CIM) put it this way: Jesus, as the vine, is not only the *root* (*source*), He is *everything*!
 - iv. Jesus explained this truth in John 14:20: "In that day you will know that I am in My Father, and you in Me, and I in you."
 - v. Paul wrote something similar in Col 1:27: to whom God willed to make known what is the riches of the glory of this mystery among the Gentiles, which is **Christ in you**, the hope of glory.
 - b. In this sense, Jesus is the *true vine* the *ultimate location & bond* of *union* w/ His people, w/ us.
- 5. Israel was God's *vine* (*vineyard*) and what God said about *Israel* is true of Israel's *Messiah*.
 - a. The **OT** teaches that *Israel* was: Abraham's *seed* (Gen 13:15); God's *Son* (Ex 4:22); & YHWH's *Servant* (Isa 52, etc.).
 - b. All these things are true of Jesus.
 - c. Thus Jesus is the *true* or *ideal* or *ultimate* vine. I.e. Jesus is the *true* Israel, the complete *fulfillment* of all Israel was *intended to be* and the one thru whom all of God's *purposes for Israel* could be fulfilled.

"I am the true vine..." As the true vine, Jesus is not simply genuine, He is ultimate – the highest & finest & fulfilling & final expression of everything this symbol suggests.

Can we apply this *one-word detail* to our Christian *growth*?

Where there is the *promise of true*, there is also the *threat of false*. So there are also, by implication, untrue - false or lesser - vines.

- 1. Whatever is the *center* of your life is your *vine*. Your *source* of energy & joy. *What is it*? Are you *seeking joy* in *untrue vines*?
 - a. Personal pleasures & goals? Pastimes? Possessions?
 - b. Even *church*, w/ its comfortable religious *culture & traditions*, can become a *spiritual substitute* for the true *Source of life & joy*.
- 2. Even more dangerous, *other vines* may be *genuine & good*, but only Jesus is the *ultimate* the *best*. Have you heard the term "*settling*"? Are you *settling*?
 - a. Are you settling for temporary *satisfaction*, *joy*, *help from* a lesser vine: your own *strength* (accomplishments), your *job* (men), a *hobby* (identity, busyness)?
 - b. Are you like *Martha*, settling for *religious bustle*, when you could be *sitting at Jesus' feet*?

- 3. How do you make Jesus your *ultimate vine*?
 - a. Theologically this pictures is simply true of every Christian (Jesus said "I am the vine, you are the branches."). But theological truths are often accompanied by helpful instructions. (Like the relationship between justification & sanctification.)

So...

- b. Ask for help (pray). "Help me grow toward& in the true Vine."
- c. *Remember* that Jesus is *the Living Word*, you connect w/ Him through the *Written Word* (various ways: QT, preaching, personal study, Christian books/media).
- d. Hang around *others* who are *abiding & bearing much fruit*. Pretty soon you'll be *more fruitful & joyful & Christ-focused* too!
