1 Thessalonians 4:1-12 Study Notes for May 29, 2016

I. Introduction

Foreign exchange students and the many struggles they face in America...

G. L. Green wrote, "Moreover, within the Christian community itself the question of fraternal love was of paramount importance since the church was open to people of all social classes and any ethnic background. Both the free and the slave were welcome, while Greeks, Romans, Macedonians, Jews, and barbarians gathered together to share the same cup in the worship of their one Lord. Men and women had equal status, as did citizens and foreigners in this community where common social boundaries were crossed as a fruit of their common salvation (Gal. 3:23; Rom. 1:16–17; Col 3:11). In such a community, it would not be surprising for questions to surface about the meaning of 'fraternal love.'" (The Letters to the Thessalonians, p. 203)

The word behind **'make it your ambition'** is φιλοτιμέομαι (*philotimeomai*) which literally means "to be fond of honor" (*phileō*, to love, *timē*, honor)...

The word for "a quiet life" is used to reference one of two concepts in Greek: either of "not speaking at all" or of "being restful." The term, however, is NOT self-defining- which means it needs a context in order to understand what specifically is being communicated by the expression...

*Point: So Paul is exhorting those in the Thessalonica who were depending on the church to meet their financial needs (1) to cease and desist, and so (2) to strive with NOT to depend upon the church for these things!

*Where We Live: We are talking here ultimately about the sufficiency of Christ!

b. Focus on the "Log in our own Eye", v. 11b.

Review: In the Social Institution of Patronage, what did the "leach" do when he wasn't singing the praises of his benefactor? Cf. 2 Thes. 3:11-12...

So what happens when you have too much free time on your hands... like some in Thessalonica? You sit around and take potshots at others in the body of Christ. You become busybodies!!!

Created to Co-Reign

Accordingly, what was Paul's command to these Christians? Cf. Mt. 7:3-5...

*Point: When it comes to the Body Life of the Church, we must do away with all forms of judgmentalism where we think that it is our duty to fix the lives of those around us and so poke our nose into other people's business! The antidote is to understand that we all will stand before God and render account for the deeds done in our lives (2 Cor. 5:10).

c. Stop Seeking from the Church what we ought to Acquire on our Own, v. 11c.

The focus here is on labor-specifically the acquiring and maintaining of a job...

The scriptural standard is quite clear, "He who does not work does not eat!" (2 Thes. 3:10)

*Point: To the one in Thessalonica who quite their job in order devote themselves to the "godly" pursuit of criticizing the church and acting like busybodies, Paul said, "Stop seeking from the church what you ought to acquire on your own!"

*Where We Live

- 1. Such is the call that rests on our lives- yet there is a twist, for in our wealthy culture few are living off the generosity of others! And so by way of application, let's exchange the concept of "physical food" (which again is NOT a problem today in the church) for "spiritual food" (which is a problem)!
