Toxic and Seditious Exodus 16:1-9

It's about our:

I. Feelings -"we did eat bread to the full" (vs. 1-3)

It's when we feel:

- A. Discontent "the whole congregation ... murmured"
- **B. Dystopian** "Would to God we had died...in the land"
- C. Desperate "brought us... to kill this whole assembly"

II. Father - "Then said the LORD unto Moses" (vs. 4-5)

It's when we forget He is our:

- A. Source "I will rain bread from heaven"
- **B.** Sufficiency "the people shall go out and gather"
- C. Sovereign "prove... whether they will walk in my law"

III. Future - "In the morning, then you shall" (vs. 6-9)

It's when we should:

- A. Consider "know that the LORD has brought you out"
- **B.** Celebrate "ye shall see the glory of the Lord"
- C. Communicate "come near...has heard your murmuring"
