Structure of the Book

- Three parts corresponding to three pictures of the Messiah
- Isaiah standing at the bottom. He sees the present failure and then the coming ideal.
- First view is of the King
 - O Chapters 1 37
 - O Concerns God's people and Assyria
 - O Q: Who is the Lord of History?
 - o Isaiah sees the failed Davidic king
 - O But behind him is the perfect King who will not fail. He is the Lord of History.
- Second view is of the Servant
 - o Chapters 38 55
 - O Concerns God's people and Babylon
 - O Q: How will God's people be redeemed from captivity?
 - o Isaiah sees the failed faith of the people
 - O But behind them is the perfect Servant who will redeem them.
- Third view is of the Conqueror
 - o Chapters 56 66
 - O Concerns God's people in an alien world
 - O Q: How will God's people fulfill their promise?
 - Isaiah sees that they are inadequate for the task.
 - o But behind them is the anointed Conqueror, who will bring to pass all of God's promises.

Structure

- Ch 7-11 contain parallel sections addressed to Judah and to Israel.
- Ch 10 is Isaiah's view of history: Yahweh is the Lord of history

Isaiah's Atonement and Commission 6:1-13

- 6:1-4 Vision
 - O In the year that King Uzziah died I saw the Lord sitting upon a throne,
- 6:5 Conviction
 - O And I said: "Woe is me!
- 6:6-7 Atonement
 - O Behold, this has touched your lips; your guilt is taken away, and your sin atoned for."
- 6:8 Call and response
 - O And I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Then I said, "Here I am! Send me.

Darkness and Light in Judah 7:1 - 9:7

- Judah's Moment of Decision 7:1-12
 - o 7:1-2 Judah attacked by Israel and Syria
 - o 7:3-9 Isaiah speaks to Ahaz
 - And the Lord said to Isaiah, "Go out to meet Ahaz, ...4 And say to him, 'Be
 careful, be quiet, do not fear... If you are not firm in faith, you will not be firm at
 all.' "
 - Crisis of faith: would Judah depend on the LORD?
 - 7:10-12 God speaks to Ahaz
 - Again the Lord spoke to Ahaz, 11 "Ask a sign of the Lord your God...12 But Ahaz said, "I will not ask, and I will not put the Lord to the test."

- Divine Judgement 7:13 8:8
 - o 7:13-16 The sign
 - And he said, "Hear then, O house of David! Is it too little for you to weary men, that you weary my God also? 14 Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel.
 - Prophecy of the Virgin birth.
 - o 7:17-20 Invasion by Assyria
 - The LORD will bring upon you and upon your people and upon your father's house such days as have not come since the day that Ephraim departed from Judah—the king of Assyria."
 - o 7:21-25 Devastation
 - o 8:1-8 Proclamation of coming destruction
- A Believing Remnant Amid An Unbelieving People 8:9-22
 - o 8:9-10 Warning to the nations
 - V8, 10 Be broken, you peoples, and be shattered; ... God is with us.
 - o 8:11-20a Exhortation to the believing remnant
 - V20 To the teaching and to the testimony
- The Royal Hope 9:1-7
 - o 9:1-2 Coming light
 - v2 The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone.
 - o 9:3-5 Coming redemption
 - o 9:6-7 Coming King
 - V7 For to us a child is born, to us a son is given;

Darkness and Light in Israel 9:8 - 11:16

- Israel's Choice of Self-Sufficiency 9:8-10
 - O The Lord has sent a word against Jacob, and it will fall on Israel; (9) and all the people will know, Ephraim and the inhabitants of Samaria, who say in pride and in arrogance of heart: (10) "The bricks have fallen, but we will build with dressed stones; the sycamores have been cut down, but we will put cedars in their place."

- Four Consequences 9:11 10:4
 - o Four consequences, each ended by the same phrase in 9:12,17,21; 10:4: "For all this his anger has not turned away, and his hand is stretched out still.
 - O V11-12 Adversaries raised up.
 - V13-17 Society collapses
 - O V18-21 Strife between people and nations
 - o 10:1-4 Injustice
- Interlude: Woe to Assyria (Isaiah's view of history) 10:5-19
 - 10:5-6 God's purpose.
 - O Ah, Assyria, the rod of my anger;
 - God is sending Assyria against His people.
 - 10:7-11 Assyria's purpose.
 - O But he does not so intend, and his heart does not so think; but it is in his heart to destroy, and to cut off nations not a few
 - Assyria's intent is conquest and destruction.
 - 10:12 God will punish Assyria.
 - When the Lord has finished all his work on Mount Zion and on Jerusalem, he will punish the speech of the arrogant heart of the king of Assyria and the boastful look in his eyes.
 - o God is sovereign.
 - O When He is finished punishing Judah, He will punish Assyria.
 - 10:13-14 Assyria's view: self-pride.
 - O V13 For he says: "By the strength of my hand I have done it...
 - The king of Assyria thinks that by his strength he has conquered.
 - 10:15 God's view: Assyria is merely a tool.
 - O Shall the axe boast over him who hews with it...
 - 10:16-19 Judgment on Assyria.
 - O V16 Therefore the Lord GOD of hosts will send wasting sickness among his stout warriors,...The remnant of the trees of his forest will be so few that a child can write them down.
 - Fulfilled in Isa 37:36-37 And the angel of the LORD went out and struck down 185,000 in the camp of the Assyrians... (37) Then Sennacherib king of Assyria departed and returned home and lived at Nineveh.

- A Believing Remnant Preserved 10:20-34
 - o 10:20-23 The believing remnant
 - o 10:24-27 Do not fear Assyria.
 - V24 Therefore thus says the Lord GOD of hosts: "O my people, who dwell in Zion, be not afraid of the Assyrians when they strike with the rod and lift up their staff against you as the Egyptians did. (25) For in a very little while my fury will come to an end, and my anger will be directed to their destruction. ...
 - o 10:28-32 Assyria will invade Judah; be stopped at Jerusalem.
 - o 10:33-34 Mighty Assyria will be brought down.
 - V33 Behold, the Lord GOD of hosts will lop the boughs with terrifying power; the great in height will be hewn down, and the lofty will be brought low. (34) He will cut down the thickets of the forest with an axe, and Lebanon will fall by the Majestic One.
- The Coming King 11:1-16
 - o 11:1-5 The coming King.
 - V1 There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse, and a branch from his roots shall bear fruit.
 - o 11:6, 9 The coming reign of peace, based on the knowledge of the LORD.
 - V6 The wolf shall dwell with the lamb...They shall not hurt or destroy in all my holy mountain; for the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the LORD as the waters cover the sea.
 - o 11:10 Ruler for all nations
 - V10 In that day the root of Jesse, who shall stand as a signal for the peoples
 - o 11:11-12 Gathering of Israel
 - V11 In that day the Lord will extend his hand yet a second time to recover the remnant that remains of his people,
 - o 11:13 Two kingdoms united
 - o 11:14 Israel victorious
 - 11:15-16 Highways for God's people

Salvation, Praise, and Thanks 12:1-6

- You will say in that day: "I will give thanks to you, O LORD, for though you were angry with me, your anger turned away, that you might comfort me. ... (6) Shout, and sing for joy, O inhabitant of Zion, for great in your midst is the Holy One of Israel."
 - Based on Isaiah's own experience in Is 6.
 - Note the emotions

Is 13 - 27 Kingdom panorama

Theme

- The nations reviewed.
 - The great powers: Babylon (13:1, 21:9), Assyria (14:25), Egypt (19:1)
 - The smaller states: Philistia (14:29), Moab (15:1), Aram (17:1), Edom (21:11), Arabia (21:13), Tyre (23:1)
 - Over all God is sovereign
- Single question: Where is security?
 - Five answers
 - o Answer 1: World empire.
 - Security through a central government.
 - The spirit of Babylon. First appeared at Babel.
 - Continues through history in successive kingdoms on the earth.
 - But God will bring down all earthly kingdoms that seek to be supreme.
 - O Answer 2: Davidic monarchy.
 - Security under the throne of David.
 - God promised David an eternal throne
 - In Isaiah's day, it seemed that the Davidic monarchy was broken forever.
 - But one day the coming King will reign from Zion.
 - Answer 3: Collective security and self-sufficiency
 - Security through power and alliances.
 - Determined to be self-sufficient.
 - Rejecting the LORD's salvation.
 - But one day all nations will enjoy the banquet provided by the LORD on Mt Zion. Moab will be excluded because of their pride.
 - o Answer 4: The people of God.
 - They seem to be caught up in the things of the world and in self-sufficiency
 - But one day they will see salvation and peace
 - o Answer 5: Triumphant end
 - One world, one people, one God.

Structure

- Three sections: 13-20, 21-23, 24-27.
- Each with five parts.
- First two sections subdivided by "oracle"; last by subject.
- First part, sections are clear. Second part, sections are enigmatic. Third part, sections are marked only by subject changes.
- Moves from clear current times to hazy future to the Last Day, when everything merges together.

Section 1

- World empire: Oracle of Babylon 13:1 14:27
 - O Isaiah looks beyond Assyria to the greater Babylon
 - O God is gathering an army of nations.
 - A day is coming when the great city will be destroyed.
 - Israel will be restored. They will take up a taunt against the king of Babylon.
 - Assyria is cited as a short-term example.
- The Davidic monarchy: Oracle of Philistia 14:28-32
 - The Philistines rejoice at the fall of the house of David.
 - O But their judgment is coming.
- Collective Security and Self-sufficiency: Oracle of Moab 15:1 16:13
 - o Moab seeks help.
 - O Salvation is offered in Zion under the Davidic monarchy.
 - Moab is too proud to accept.
- The People of God: Oracle of Damascus 17:1 18:7
 - O Aram and Ephraim are allied against Assyria. Aram named because it predominates.
 - O But destruction will fall upon the ten tribes.
- Triumphant End: Oracle of Egypt 19:1 20:6
 - O God will bring judgment upon the Egyptians for her sins.
 - O But later they will cry out to God, and He will save them.

Section 2

- One-world government: Oracle of the wilderness of the sea 21:1-10
 - O A harsh vision, like a storm sweeping across the wilderness.
 - O A watchman is set. This is Isaiah.
 - He watches, riders approach. They say, "Babylon is fallen."
 - The watchman announces the news to God's people.
- The Davidic monarchy: Oracle of silence 21:11-12
 - One calls from Seir (Edom): "How long is the night?"
 - The watchman answers, "Morning comes. Seek the true God and repent."
- Collective Security and Self-sufficiency: Oracle of Arabia 21:13-17
 - Arabia is in chaos; fugitives are fleeing from battle.
 - The fugitives band together for survival. There is no seeking after God.
- The People of God: Oracle of the valley of vision 22:1-25
 - O Valley of vision refers to Jerusalem.
 - They were given a vision from God (His law).
 - O Now Isaiah sees a vision of the city's destruction.
 - The cause is self-sufficiency.
- Triumphant End: Oracle of Tyre 23:1-18
 - O Tyre will be destroyed by Babylon.
 - But later she will be visited by the LORD and will resume her commerce.

• The results of her trading will be enjoyed by God's people.

Section 3

- One-world government: The city of chaos 24:1-20
 - O The earth is devastated.
 - The world city is destroyed.
 - The believing remnant gives praise and glory to God.
- The Davidic monarchy: The King of glory 24:1-23
 - O The earth is devastated.
 - The LORD will punish the host of heaven, and the kings of the earth.
 - The LORD of Hosts will reign on Mount Zion.
- Collective Security and Self-sufficiency: Salvation for all 25:1-12
 - O God is praised for His works and His faithfulness.
 - All nations feast at a lavish banquet provided by Him.
 - o Proud Moab is excluded.
- The People of God: The strong city 26:1-21
 - O God has made a strong city, guarded by salvation.
 - The believing remnant who trust in Him are kept in perfect peace.
- Triumphant End: Universal Israel 27:1-13
 - O The LORD will slay the dragon in the sea.
 - o Israel will be redeemed.
 - o The world city will be destroyed.
 - O Israel, Assyria, and Egypt will all worship the LORD in Jerusalem.

Isaiah 28 - 37 The Lord of History

Overview

- These chapters form the greatest of Isaiah's interim fulfillments.
- He had prophesied one world, one people, one God. Now he answers the the question: Is it real?
- The test case was the "Egyptian alliance" situation in the days of Hezekiah. Judah was under Assyria. Merodach-Baladan of Babylon was urging alliance against Assyria. Egypt was promising assistance for a revolt. Isaiah's job was to urge the way of faith, trusting in Yahweh rather than in politics.
- Hezekiah was fascinated with military/political solutions. But in the end, with the Assyrians at the gate of Jerusalem, he trusted in the LORD, and the city was delivered.

The first woe: the word of God and the purpose of God 28:1-29

- Message regarding Samaria 28:1-6
 - o V1 The pride of Samaria

 - Samaria's pride brings about destruction.

 - Samaria will be reestablished in justice and strength.
 - For the remnant, glory and strength.
- Message regarding Jerusalem 28:7-22

 - Picture of drunken revelry. May be a banquet to celebrate the Egyptian alliance.
 - The priest and the prophet reel. All communication with God is cut off.

 - Isaiah is reviled as one who speaks childish gibberish.
 - He replies that they will hear gibberish in captivity.

- O V14-19 The word of the LORD preeminent
 - Call to hear the word of the LORD.
 - Their lies will not save them.
 - God has laid in Zion a true cornerstone of salvation.
 - Righteousness will be the plumb line.
 - Judgment will come upon them.
- V20-22 Insufficient provision; appeal to repent
 - Their own provisions are insufficient.
 - God will arise in judgment.
 - Appeal to repent.
- The discriminating LORD 28:23-29
 - O V23-26 Purposeful tilling and sowing. As is proper.
 - O V27-28 Purposeful harvesting and threshing. Not forever.
 - O V29 The LORD is wonderful in counsel and excellent in wisdom.

The second woe: Is anything too hard for the LORD? 29:1-14

- Chastening and deliverance 29:1-8
 - o V1-4 Jerusalem humbled
 - Jerusalem is the LORD's ariel (altar-hearth); The place of the ever-burning fire.
 - Where the holy God dwells.
 - Where holy wrath will be poured out.
 - o V5-8 Jerusalem delivered
 - The LORD will arise.
 - Her foes will be no more.
- Blindness and a coming wonder 29:9-14
 - V9 Spiritual blindness comes from willful blindness and God's judgment.
 - V10 Results are (1) mind asleep (2) means of spiritual enlightenment removed.

 - Closed book
 - Cannot read
 - V13 Diagnosis
 - External religion with no internal reality
 - Worship by conformity to the rules of men

 - Denying His presence.

 - Denying God as omniscient.

 - Creation turned upside-down

Epilogue 36:1 - 37:38

- Historical narrative paralleling 2 Ki 18-19. Hezekiah had submitted to Assyria, sending tribute to buy peace. The king of Assyrian had accepted the tribute, but immediately renewed his pressure on Hezekiah, conquering all of Judah's fortified cities and coming to the gates of Jerusalem. Now the strong world ruler was in direct confrontation with the weak Davidic king in the city of promise. In Is 14:25 the LORD had promised to break Assyria, so His honor was on the line. Now was the time for Him to demonstrate His mastery of history.
- First Assyrian embassy 36:1 37:7
 - o 36:1-22 The Rabshakeh speaks to the Judean officials, urging surrender.
 - o 37:1-7 Hezekiah seeks Isaiah's help. Isaiah says do not fear; the Assyrians will depart and their king will die in his own land.
- Second Assyrian embassy 37:8-35
 - o 37:8-9 The Assyrians leave and return.
 - o 37:10-13 The Rabshakeh sends a letter to Hezekiah seeking his surrender.

- Q: How will God's people be redeemed from captivity?
- Historical context
 - Hezekiah is king of Judah.
 - O Assyrian power waning. Babylon rising.

Hezekiah's Test of Faith (38 - 39)

Background: Hezekiah's sickness and recovery 38:1-22

- The events 38:1-8
 - O Hezekiah becomes sick, prays to the LORD, and is given healing and assurance that Assyria will not conquer Jerusalem.
- Hezekiah's witness 38:9-20
 - O Hezekiah acknowledges the blessing given to him and expresses his trust in the LORD.
- Epilogue 38:21-22
 - Summary of the events: a proved answer to faith.

The test of faith 39:1-8

- Using concern and flattery, Merodach-Baladan sought alliance with Hezekiah against Assyria. Hezekiah received his embassy, forgetting his God. Isaiah therefore said that all he had would go to Babylon.

The great deliverance: the work of Cyrus 44:24 - 48:22

Cyrus: Builder and Conqueror 44:24 - 45:8

- God and His word 44:24-26a
 - V24 Here the LORD, Israel's Creator and Redeemer, presents Himself as the creator of heaven and earth.
 - O V25 He makes the wisdom of men foolishness
 - O V26a He performs His word given through His Servant and His prophets.
- God and His purpose 44:26b-28
 - O V26b Here is God's purpose: to raise up Jerusalem and the cities of Judah from their ruins
 - o V27 He will make a way for His people.
 - O V28 He will bring Cyrus to perform this as the shepherd of God's people

 - V20-21 The idolaters have no knowledge. I am the righteous God and Savior, there is no other
 - V22-25 Call to salvation
 - V22 Here is a call to salvation to all the ends of the earth.
 - V23 God has sworn that every knee will bow to Him. Only in God are righteousness and strength.
 - V24 All those who were angry at Him will be put to shame.
 - V25 All the offspring of Israel will be justified and glorified.
- Appeal to the Rebels 46:1-13
 - V1-4 Dead idols and the living God
 - V1-2 Babylon's idols will be borne into captivity they cannot save themselves.
 - V3-4 God, rather than being borne by men, has borne His people from their birth, and will deliver them.
 - V5-7 Man-made gods, unable to save
 - V5 The idols are challenged.
 - V6-7 Here is the verdict: Idols are made by men, carried by men and set in their place by men. They cannot move by themselves. Men cry to them, but they cannot answer or save.
 - V8-11 Appeal to remember God
 - V8-9a The transgressors are challenged to remember the things of old.
 - v9b-11 The LORD is God and there is no other. He declares the end from the beginning and His counsel will stand. He will bring a man from a far country to accomplish His purpose.
 - o V12 Appeal to be saved
 - V12 Here is an appeal to those who are stubborn and unrighteous. God is bringing His righteousness and salvation without delay. God will bring His salvation to Zion, and His glory to Israel.

Free but not yet home 47:1 - 48:22

- Babylon's Fall 47:1-15
 - o V1-7 Divine vengeance applied and explained
 - V1a The prophet pronounces vengeance on Babylon.
 - V1b-3a She will no longer be tender and delicate, rather she will know slavery and violation.
 - V3b-4 The LORD will take vengeance and will spare no one. He is the Redeemer and the Holy One of Israel.
 - V5-7 Here is the cause for vengeance. The LORD was angry with His people and gave them into your hand; you showed them no mercy. Rather you said, "I shall be mistress forever." You did not consider these things.
 - O V8-11 Judgment for pride
 - V8 The prophet describes Babylon's pride. She is a lover of pleasures who sits securely, who says in her heart, "I am, and there is no one besides me, I shall not sit as a widow or know the loss of children".
 - V9 The prophet pronounces judgment: You will be childless and a widow in spite of your many sorceries and great enchantments.
 - V10 Continues the description of Babylon's pride: you felt secure in your wickedness; you said, "No one sees me"; your wisdom and your knowledge led you astray, and you said in your heart, "I am, and there is no one besides me."
 - V11 Continues the pronouncement of judgment: Disaster and ruin will come upon you suddenly. You will not be able to atone, or to charm it away.
 - V12-15 Religion that failed
 - V12 Challenge to look to enchantments and sorceries.
 - V13 Challenge to look to the astrologers upon whom Babylon depended for counsel.
 - V14-15 The result: All are consumed as by fire. They wander about and cannot save.

- Home, Yet Not Home 48:1-22
 - O V1-2 Israel called to hear
 - V1-2 The house of Israel is called to hear. They are very religious: they swear by the name of the Lord and confess the God of Israel; they call themselves after the holy city, and stay themselves on the God of Israel...but not in truth or right.
 - O V3-5 The former things: blessings for the unworthy
 - V3 The LORD declared the former things and then performed them.
 - V4-5 Why the LORD declared them: He knew that Israel was obstinate and would say that their idols were responsible.
 - V6-8 New things declared
 - V6 Now the LORD announces new things, that Israel has not known.
 - V7-8 Likewise, they were not revealed previously because God knew that Israel was rebellious and would deal treacherously.
 - O V9-11 The reason for the new things
 - V9 For the sake of His name God defers His anger, otherwise Israel would be cut off.
 - V10 He has refined Israel with affliction.
 - V11 He does this for the sake of His name. His glory He will not give to another.
 - V12-13 The sovereign Lord
 - V12a Israel is called by the LORD to hear.
 - V12v-13 He is the first and the last. He laid out the earth and spread out the heavens.
 - V14-15 The acting Lord
 - V14a Call to hear. God has declared these things.
 - V14b-15 He will call one to perform His purpose on Babylon
 - o V16 The Servant speaks
 - V16 Not spoken in secret; there at the beginning; now sent by God; having His Spirit.
 - V17-19 The peace that was forfeited
 - V17 God leads HIs people in the way they should go.
 - V18-19 If they had heeded Him, they would have had peace and righteousness, their descendants would have been as numerous as the sand on the seashore, and they would have never been cut off from God.
 - V20-21 Deliverance from Babylon
 - V20 Israel is called out of Babylon. They are to shout with joy, and proclaim their salvation to the end of the earth.
 - V21 A way is made for them just as in the Exodus.
 - V22 The continuing problem
 - V22 But these are the same people who abandoned the LORD's peace. Delivery from Babylon has not changed them. For the wicked there is still no peace.

Nation and Servant Contrasted 49:14 - 50:9

- Here is the contrast between the nation and the Servant.
 - O The nation complains in self-pity; they are given multiple inducements to faith but will not trust.
 - The Servant is warned of suffering to come, and responds with commitment.
 - O Even so, the LORD does not give up on His people.
- The nation's complaint 49:14
 - O Zion (the nation) does not believe in the deliverance just promised. Instead she complains that God has forsaken her.
- God's promises 49:15 50:3
 - O V15-16 The promise that God's people are not forgotten.
 - O V17-23 The promise of increase
 - o V24-26 The promise of deliverance
- The nation's lack of trust 50:1-3
 - O V1 The issue of legality.
 - There was no certificate of divorce, or unpaid debt.
 - Israel was in captivity because of her sin.
 - The LORD has the right to redeem her.
 - O V2a The nation's response
 - The LORD came and called; no one answered,.
 - o V2b-3 The LORD's qualifications
 - He is able to redeem and to deliver.
 - Pictures from the Exodus: sea dried up, fish dying, black darkness.
- The willing Servant 50:4-9
 - o V4 The Servant's competence
 - An effective tongue
 - A disciple's ear
 - o V5 The Servant's willingness
 - V6 The Servant's trials
 - o V7-9 The Servant's victory
 - The LORD God helps Him.
 - He is not ashamed.
 - His enemies will wear out and be eaten up.

- Call to Trust 50:10-11
 - o V10 Those who trust
 - They encounter darkness.
 - They trust in God.
 - Structure
 - Fears the LORD = trusts in the name of the LORD.
 - Obeys the voice of His Servant = relies on his God.
 - O V11 Those who do not trust
 - They encounter darkness
 - They build a fire, equip themselves with torches, walk by the light of the torches.
 - Here is self-reliance, saying, "There is no God." Contrast the believer in v10: relies on his God.

 - Removed from Zion's hand.
 - Given to her tormentors.

- o The second call: holiness enjoyed 52:1-10
 - V1-2 Holiness and royalty
 - Call to put on strength.
 - Jerusalem now a holy city, in beautiful garments.
 - No more uncircumcised and unclean.
 - Lifted up from the dust, bonds removed
 - Seated as royalty.

 - God speaks of the redemption of His people.

 - Before Him. Separate from the LORD.
 - Grow up…like a young plant. Born and grows up: a man.
 - Like a root out of dry ground. From the barren nation Israel.
 - No form or majesty...no beauty. No outward indication that this is the Messiah.
 - despised and rejected by men. Because He is not attractive; not what they expect.
 - o V4-6 His mission
 - Men will see Him as afflicted of God.
 - He will bear the punishment for their sins.
 - All men have gone astray, but by His sacrifice they will be reconciled to God.

 - He will be unjustly oppressed and afflicted.
 - He will be silent in the face of the judgment.
 - He will be killed for the sins of His people.

 - Their heritage is their idols, which are nothing.
 - o V13b-19 The LORD's people
 - V13b The heritage of the righteous. To possess the land and dwell with God on His holy mountain.
 - V14 Their way prepared.
 - V15 God is with them to revive their heart and spirit
 - V16-19 True healing and peace
 - V19 Peace, peace, to the far and to the near," says the LORD, "and I will heal him.
 - O V 20-21 Warning to the wicked
 - Repeats 48:22: "There is no peace," says my God, "for the wicked."

Ineffective religion 58:1-14.

- V1 Call to the prophet. Declare to Israel their sins.
- V2 Israel's religious practice: external forms, no internal reality.
- V3-12 Fasting
 - o V3a Question: Why is our fasting ineffective?
 - O V3-4 What they were doing: seeking their own pleasure, oppressing their workers, quarrelling, fighting wickedly.
 - o V5-7 What is acceptable fasting: humility, removal of oppression, helping the poor
 - V8-12 Benefits of acceptable fasting: light, healing, righteousness, guarded by the glory of the LORD, prayer answered, strong bones, like a watered garden, ancient ruins rebuilt, called repairer/restorer.
- V13-14 Sabbath-keeping
 - O What they were doing: doing their own pleasure, going their own ways, talking idly
 - O What is acceptable Sabbath-keeping: calling the Sabbath a delight, honoring it.
 - O Benefits of acceptable Sabbath-keeping: delight in the LORD, ride on the heights of the earth, obtain the heritage of Jacob.

The guilty people 59:1-13

- V1-2 The basic problem: separated from God by sin
- V3-8 Description of their sins
- V9-13 Confession of sin and helplessness
 - The prophet identifies with his people.

The Work Accomplished 59:14 - 63:6

Situation and remedy: the promised Conqueror 59:14-21

- V14-16a Summary of the situation
 - O No justice or righteousness or truth
 - O The righteous man makes himself a prey
 - No one to intercede
- V15b-16a The LORD's reaction
 - O Displeased that there was no justice.
 - O Wondered that there was no intercessor.
- V16b-17 The LORD's response
 - Picture of a soldier dressing for battle.
- V18-20 Results
 - To His enemies: a Conqueror who repays them for their deeds and causes them to fear the LORD.
 - O To His people: a Redeemer who saves them.
 - O Zion becomes the center of the world.
- V21 The Covenant Mediator
 - o The LORD speaking to the Covenant Mediator.
 - One who has His Spirit
 - One who has His words.
 - The covenant: God's word will abide forever with His people.

The universal city 60:1-22

- V1-3 The glory of the Lord in Zion
 - o Darkness covers the world
 - O The Lord's glory on Zion gives light to the world.
 - O The nations come to the light.
- V4-9 The world in Zion
 - Sons and daughters come
 - The wealth of the world comes
 - O They are accepted at the Lord's altar.
 - O Zion is radiant with joy and made beautiful by the Lord.
- V10-14 The city of destiny
 - Foreigners shall build Zion, calling her the City of the LORD
 - Her gates are open continually to receive the wealth of the nations.
 - o Those who will not serve her will perish.
- V15-22 Zion transformed
 - From forsaken, hated, and shunned to majestic and a joy forever with a Savior.
 - O That the Lord might be glorified.

- 66:1-24 Judgment and hope
 - V1-2 God's resting place
 - A physical building cannot contain God.
 - He comes to dwell with those who are humble, contrite in spirit, tremble at God's word
 - O V3-4 False worship and its end
 - Levitical sacrifices are like idol-worship for those who will not listen to God.
 - For them, harsh treatment is coming. Their fears will come upon them.
 - V5-6 True worship and its end
 - True worship is trembling at God's word
 - True worshippers hope in God but are presently put to shame.
 - One day their hope will be vindicated and their enemies put to shame.
 - o V7-14 The coming glory of Jerusalem
 - Brought into being in a day.
 - Those who mourn now over her will rejoice.
 - All that Zion means will be present to be enjoyed to the fullest.
 - She will be a city of peace and comfort
 - O V15-17 The Lord's judgment
 - The Lord will come in fire of judgment
 - Those who worship falsely will come to an end.
 - o V18-23 the world gathering
 - All nations will be gathered
 - A sign will be set among them. The cross.
 - Missionaries sent to those who have not heard of God's fame or seen His glory.
 - Believers will be brought from all nations as an offering to the Lord.
 - Thus all nations will worship Him.
 - O V24 The end of the wicked
