INTRODUCTION

We see \rightarrow the people & timing of God

God's providence in carrying out His eternal purposes

- He uses people
- He places them / moves them where He wants them
- {Map Charlotte placed on front of the bulletin}
- He places them there at the precise time He wants them there
 - We are alive today ...
 - We live where we do ...

{Earlier this week . . .} – Esther 4:14

{Sometimes I hear people say, and I've said it myself: "I wish I could have lived back in the day, in some previous time." – NO!}

{JMac quote:

The Bible teaches that God is at work in everything that happens and nothing occurs outside His will. Everything we experience is within the context of God's plan to accomplish His own ends. We commonly use two words to describe God's work of bringing about His will: *providence* and *miracles*. A miracle is when He suspends natural law and intervenes supernaturally. Providence is when He takes natural events—millions and billions of apparently disconnected activities—and pulls them all together to create exactly what He wants, without violating natural laws or human actions.

In a sense, providence is a greater miracle than a miracle. For God to stop the natural flow and inject a supernatural outcome is a one-dimensional act on His part. For God to cause His own will to be accomplished through myriad independent exigencies is a miracle beyond comprehension. And that's exactly how He operates the entire universe in which we live.

We've all heard people say, "I'm not comfortable with a view of divine sovereignty that takes away human will." But God's sovereignty does not nullify or do violence to the will of any creature. Furthermore, rightly understood, the doctrine of divine sovereignty is the most comforting and liberating truth of all. I don't want to live in a world where God is not in charge. That would be a frightening, terrifying existence. The fact that every single event in the universe fits perfectly into the will and purposes of our eternally kind, gracious, and good God—that is a massive concept with massive benefits and implications.

I. Paul 18-23

Paul was:

- A high caliber leader great organizational and leadership skills
- An intellectual great mind & highly educated
- Steeped in knowledge of the Bible O.T.
- A man of great zeal and motivation

(18) So Paul still remained a good while.

- Corinth was a place of encouragement and reinvigoration for Paul
- A city that was morally & spiritually corrupt

Then he took leave of the brethren and sailed for Syria, and Priscilla and Aquila *were* with him. He had *his* hair cut off at Cenchrea, for he had taken a vow.

- Numbers 6
- Hair
- Fruit of the vine
- Could touch nothing dead, defiling \rightarrow unclean
- Why would Paul do this?
 - Acts = transition
 - From the Jewish faith to Christianity
 - {ex: Peter & John time of prayer}

(19) And he came to Ephesus,

• previously forbidden

and left them there;

A & P

but he himself entered the synagogue and reasoned with the Jews.

• (v.6)

(20) When they asked *him* to stay a longer time with them, he did not consent, (21) but took leave of them, saying, "I must by all means keep this coming feast in Jerusalem; but I will return again to you, God willing." And he sailed from Ephesus.

(22) And when he had landed at Caesarea,

II. Apollos 24-28

Introduced to a new personality – would become somewhat prominent: especially in Corinth

(24) Now a certain Jew named Apollos,

• named after the Greek god Apollo

born at <mark>Alexandria</mark>,

• a great center of learning

an eloquent man

- a "man of words" / great oratorical skills
- "wordsmith"

and mighty in the Scriptures,

came to Ephesus.

- (25) This man had been instructed in the way of the Lord;
 - large Jewish community in Alexandria 1/3

and being fervent in spirit, he spoke and <mark>taught accurately</mark> the things of the Lord,

• He knew what the Messiah would be like

though he knew only the baptism of John.

(26) So he began to speak boldly in the synagogue.

When Aquila and Priscilla heard him,

they <mark>took him aside and explained to him the way of God more accurately</mark>.

(27) And when he desired to cross to Achaia,


• Roman Province: Athens & Corinth

<u>v. 2</u>

- Claudius, Emperor of Rome 41-54
- Decree expelling all Jews from Rome 49
- Seutonius, Roman historian, biographies of 12 successive Roman emperors:
 - "Since the Jews constantly made disturbances at the instigation of Chrestus, he (Claudius) expelled them from Rome."
- Here's the picture:
 - A group of Christians are faithfully evangelizing in Rome
 - Claudius thinks this is just a sect of the Jews ...
 - He expels all Jews from Rome in 49
 - A & P have to move: land in Corinth
 - Paul comes to Corinth A & P help him ...
 - They sail with Paul to Ephesus
 - Apollos comes to Ephesus
 - A & P helped Apollos understand the Scripture and the way of God more accurately
