I. Prepare to face an unsubtle enemy

- A. Who the Devil is: a rebellious spirit; proud, but not a counterpart of God. (1 Timothy 3:11; John 8:44; Acts 5:3; 1 Chronicles 21:1; John 13:2; James 4:7; Acts 10:38; Job 1-2; Zechariah 3:1-2; 1 Timothy 3:7; 2 Timothy 2:26; Acts 26:16-18; Hebrews 2:14; 1 John 3:8,10; Genesis 3:1-15; Revelation 12:9)
- B. The nature of the Devil's attacks: snake (Genesis 3; James 4:7) or lion
- C. Not necessarily pervasive (all the world is not demonic)
 - i. People will respond to our Christian profession and life in different ways.
 - ii. Our faithfulness is the means by which people will come to glorify Christ.
 - iii. We must avoid becoming "dualists"
- D. But he is out there: we should expect to be attacked as we engage the world in word and deed.

II. Resisting the Devil

- E. We serve not because of who the world is, or because we are appreciated, but because of who we are in Christ ("called ... to eternal glory").

III.Jesus is able to gather and care for scattered sheep.

- A. Many people come from church backgrounds that have been destroyed by the Devil's attacks.
- B. We need a Good Shepherd, not no shepherd. (John 10:11-14)
- C. He "saw that the people were like sheep without a shepherd." (Mark 6:34)
- D. "Strike the shepherd and the sheep will be scattered." (Zechariah 13:7; Mark 14:27)
- E. "The Lion of the tribe of Judah" (Genesis 49:9-10; Revelation 5:5)
