The Parable of the Barren Fig Tree (Luke 13:6-9)

The Jews widely held that catastrophe was a sign of God's judgment
In spite of the book of Job, many held "disaster" to be proof of sin.

Jesus often dealt with this type of self-righteous moralism of the Jews
Jesus just rebuked the Jews for not understanding the times (12:54-59)
Some tell Jesus of the Galileans slaughtered by Pilate while sacrificing
Jesus warning them about their own sin: those killed by tower of Siloam

I. The Parable of the Barren Fig Tree – Described

V 6 certain man had a fig tree, planted it & sought fruit but found none
V 7 after three years, the keeper was to cut the tree down: taking up space
V 8 The keeper asked the master to give it a year: dig & fertilize the tree
V 9 if it bears fruit, then well, if not then after that you can cut it down.

II. Applying the Principles of the Parable of the Fig Tree: Five Principles

- 1. God has placed us in the most favorable circumstances for producing and bringing forth fruit.
- 2. God expects abundant fruit from a tree on which He has bestowed such unparalleled blessings and privileges
- 3. God pronounces sentence of destruction on all who, having has such privileges, bring forth no fruit.
- 4. This sentence proclaimed is not immediately brought to fruition
- 5. May God cause us to lay this lesson to heart
