But since Christ died for us, why must we also die?

Answer:

Our death is not a satisfaction for our sins, but the abolishing of sin and our passage into everlasting life.

What other benefit do we receive by the death of Christ?

Answer:

That by virtue of His death our old man is crucified, slain, and buried together with Him, figured out in holy baptism, that henceforth evil lusts and desires may not reign in us, but we may offer ourselves unto Him a sacrifice of thanksgiving.
