

Verse 5c

The word Paul used here for "conviction" means "supreme fullness" and "certainty." It is a strong word. But then he modifies it with the word "full" $(\pi o\lambda \dot{v}\zeta \ [polus])$ which makes it even stronger (the word $\pi o\lambda \dot{v}\zeta$



[polus] means full or complete). Putting the words together, Paul says fourthly, "Our gospel... came to you... with complete, supreme fullness of conviction!"

Verse 6a

Paul was a man mature in his faith. As such, he served the Lord even when it resulted in great conflict and pain. Well get this... that is exactly what the Thessalonians- this brand new church- did as well.

"..much tribulation..." (θλῖψις [thlipsis])

"...and of the Lord"

Putting it into Practice

- 1. It is no wonder why the Thessalonians were a model church in the ancient world. All that they were and did before God was on account of a steadfast, immovable conviction concerning God, His Kingdom, His Gospel, and His word (cf. 1 Thes. 2:13a)!
- 2. The Fruit of Conviction

Col. 2:1-2a

Heb. 10:34b

This could be in reference to Paul's conviction-how he preached the word. However, it is best to take this in reference to how the Thessalonians received Paul's preaching. Throughout this first chapter, Paul is reflecting NOT upon his ministry in Thessalonica *per se*, BUT clearly the Thessalonians' response. Accordingly, if there is a lack of specificity in the reference of an activity (as it is here), it is most safe to take it first in reference to the Thessalonians, then those on the outside. N.B., in chapter 2, Paul's focus shifts to his ministry and conduct in Thessalonica. Accordingly, I side with FF. Bruce, Masson, Moore, Findlay, and Dunn.

5. Godly Leaders, v. 5d.

<u>Pleaders with a Cause</u>: in some of his epistles, Paul had to mount a defense against the accusation that that is what he was about when he came preaching Christ (cf. 1 Cor. 9:11-12; Acts 20:33-34)...

Paul was NOT like the countless rabble who drifted through a town trying to manipulate the populace into given them their money. Instead, Paul proved to be a servant, and so a giver- not a taker!...

1 Thes. 2:5-7

...and because of this, Paul proved to be an example of what godliness and service is all about!

=v. 6a: "You also became imitators of us and of the Lord..."

The Importance of Godly Examples

Christ as a "Type"

All Christians are to be "Types" (Phil. 3:17; 1 Tim. 4:12; Tit. 2:7-8a; 1 Cor. 11:1)

Putting it into Practice

1. Do you live mindful that you are an example of what it means to be a servant of Christ?

Richard Baxter exhorted, "As long as men have eyes as well as ears, they will think they *see* your meaning as well as *hear* it; and they are apter to believe their sight than their hearing, as being the more perfect sense of the two. All that a minister does, is a kind of preaching; and if you live a covetous or careless life, you preach these sins to your people by your practice." (*The Reformed Pastor*, pp. 84-85)

2. The church in Thessalonica from the start had godliness personified in the flesh. As such, they didn't have to debate how to go about living in a sinful world as Christians; they saw it in Paul. No wonder they became the standard of what a church ought to be.

6. Assurance, v. 6b.

This verse tells us two things...

- 1. The Thessalonians did not have an easy go of it; they began their Christian life in the midst of overwhelming pressure- pressure to defect, forsake, and so dishonor the Lord (cf. 1 Thes. 3:3b-4)!
- 2. Yet amazingly, none of this fazed them as they were filled with a divinely inspired confidence that in and through all things, it was well with their soul!

...that is what is behind the word "joy"...

- 1. Happiness → happenstance
- 2. Joy: a conviction concerning one's relationship with God. IF you know Christ and so know that (1) your sins have been paid in full, (2) you stand before God perfect in Christ, (3) you will never know the condemnation of God, and that (4) on the Day of Judgment, God will welcome you into His kingdom, THEN in the here and now you have the conviction that it is well with your soul... we call that Assurance! Now if you have that conviction, then you have joy!

The Source of Assurance

The Holy Spirit

Living unto Christ (cf. Heb. 6:10-12)

Gordon Fee looking at the Thessalonians observed, "...life as a pagan may have had its moments of happiness, as it does for humanity in general, but by and large it was for them a life of heaviness and toil, arid in religion and empty in personal fulfillment-especially for the slaves and poor freedmen who would have made up a large sector of the typical early Christian congregation (cf. 1 Cor 1:26). But in coming to Christ and thus receiving the Holy Spirit, they had been filled with such an unparalleled joy... this is the one characteristic of their life in the Spirit that Paul recalls for them as clear evidence of their conversion." (*The First and Second Letters to the Thessalonians*, p. 39)

A. W. Tozer wrote, "The man who comes to a right belief about God [via the gospel] is relieved of ten thousand temporal problems, for he sees at once that these have to do with matters which at the most cannot concern him for very long." (*The Knowledge of the Holy*, pp. 10-11)
