Introduction (from J. Alec Motyer)

In Isaiah's prophecy up to this point

- Through Cyrus, Israel has been returned to Jerusalem from Babylon.
- However, they are the same people as when they left.
 - No spiritual transformation
 - They have not taken possession of the Servant's victory.
 - O As Isaiah warned them in 48:22: No peace for the wicked
- No Davidic ruler
 - o Ruled by local governors under a pagan king.
 - O All the royal promises are true but not yet fulfilled.
 - Is 9:1-6
 - Is 11:1-9
 - 32:1-8
 - **33:17-24**

A New Testament parallel

- With Christ's birth, the promised King arrived. (Lk 1:31-33)
- With His death and resurrection, the saving work of the Servant was completed. Now He sits enthroned at the right hand of the Father. (Heb 10:12)
- But His kingship is not yet realized on the earth: the world rulers of this darkness are active (Eph 6:12) and His people see Him only dimly (1 Cor 13:12).
- The world awaits the return of the King as Conqueror, when every knee will bow and acknowledge Him as Lord (Ph 2:9-11), and His people will become like Him because they see Him clearly as He is. (1 Jn 3:2)

In 56 - 66 Isaiah describes the existing community

- Inadequate leaders 56:9-12
- Spiritually divided (57:1-2; 59:14-15; 65:11-12)
 - o On one side, false religion (57:3-13; 65;3-7)
 - On the other, a deep sense of sin (59:1-15) and spiritual longing (64:1-2)

Then he answers the longing with glorious promises

- The LORD Himself will intervene (59:16-19; 66:14-16)
- He will bring healing, peace (57:15-21), provision (65:13-16)
- Zion will become glorious
 - o The focal point of all the earth (60; 62; 66:7-13, 17-24)
 - The center of the new creation (65:17-24)

Central to all is the third messianic figure: the coming Conqueror (59:20-21; 61:1-3; 61:10 - 62:7; 63:1-6)

The ideal and the actual 56:1 - 59:13

- The divided people 56:9 57:21
- Ineffective religion 58
- The guilty people 59

The waiting people 56:1-8

- V1-2 Expectant waiting; resulting blessing
 - V1 ...for soon my salvation will come
- V3-8 All-embracing inclusiveness
 - Two examples: the eunuch and the foreigner
 - o The eunuch
 - Who fears having no legacy.
 - He who believes: keeps the Sabbath, chooses the things that please God, holds fast the LORD's covenant.
 - He will be blessed: a place in God's house, a monument, an everlasting name.
 - The foreigner
 - Who fears being separated from God's people.
 - He who believes: joins themselves to the LORD, ministers to Him, loves His name, is His servant, keeps the Sabbath, holds fast His covenant.
 - He will be blessed: brought to God's holy mountain, joyful in God's house of prayer, burnt offerings and sacrifices accepted.
 - o V7b-8 Summary
 - V7 ...a house of prayer for all peoples.

The divided people 56:9 - 57:21

- Failure of the leaders 56:9-12
 - o V9 The beasts
 - All you beasts of the field, come to devour.
 - Israel's enemies, either external or internal.
 - Called to a feast
 - o V10-12 The watchmen
 - Those charged with guarding the flock.
 - Unable: blind, without knowledge, unable to bark.
 - Unwilling: dreaming, lying down, loving to slumber
 - Insatiable appetite: never have enough
 - Selfish: all turned to their own way
 - Complacent: tomorrow will be like this day
- The prostitute's brood and the LORD's household 57:1-21
 - A jumbled passage reflecting the jumble of life in a divided society
 - V1a Society unfriendly to righteousness
 - The righteous man perishes and no one lays it to heart.
 - V1b-2 The peace of the righteous
 - He enters into peace.
 - V3-10 Offspring of adultery
 - V3-4 Mocking the LORD
 - V5-8 Pagan worship
 - V9-10 Politics
 - o V11-13a Judgment
 - God speaking.
 - He held His peace so they would repent, but they did not.
 - Their heritage is their idols, which are nothing.
 - O V13b-19 The LORD's people
 - V13b The heritage of the righteous.
 - V13 ...But he who takes refuge in me shall possess the land and shall inherit my holy mountain.
 - V14 Their way prepared.
 - V14 Build up, build up, prepare the way, remove every obstruction from my people's way.
 - V15 God is with them to revive their heart and spirit
 - V15 I dwell in the high and holy place, and also with him who is of a contrite and lowly spirit, to revive the spirit of the lowly, and to revive the heart of the contrite.
 - V16-19 True healing and peace
 - V19 Peace, peace, to the far and to the near," says the LORD, "and I will heal him.
 - V 20-21 Warning to the wicked
 - V21 "There is no peace," says my God, "for the wicked."

Ineffective religion 58:1-14

- The prophet uses the examples of fasting and Sabbath-keeping to show why Israel's religious practices are ineffective.
- V1 Call to the prophet.
 - V1 Cry aloud; do not hold back; lift up your voice like a trumpet; declare to my people their transgression
- V2 Israel's religious practice: external forms, no internal reality.
 - O V2 ...as if they were a nation that did righteousness
- V3-12 Fasting
 - o V3a Question: Why is our fasting ineffective?
 - O V3-4 What they were doing: seeking their own pleasure, oppressing their workers, quarrelling, fighting wickedly.
 - O V5-7 What is acceptable fasting: humility, removal of oppression, helping the poor
 - V8-12 Benefits of acceptable fasting: light, healing, righteousness, guarded by the glory of the LORD, prayer answered, strong bones, like a watered garden, ancient ruins rebuilt, called repairer/restorer.
- V13-14 Sabbath-keeping
 - O What they were doing: doing their own pleasure, going their own ways, talking idly
 - What is acceptable Sabbath-keeping: calling the Sabbath a delight, honoring it.
 - O Benefits of acceptable Sabbath-keeping: delight in the LORD, ride on the heights of the earth, obtain the heritage of Jacob.

The guilty people 59:1-13

- The prophet continues the accusation of sin. Then he meets the accusations with a confession of sin and helplessness before God.
- V1-2 The basic problem: separated from God by sin
 - O V2 your iniquities have made a separation between you and your God
- V3-8 Description of their sins
 - O V3 ... For your hands are defiled with blood and your fingers with iniquity
- V9-13 Confession of sin and helplessness
 - Change of tense to first person plural. The prophet identifies with his people.
 - V9 Therefore justice is far from us, and righteousness does not overtake us...
 - O V11 ...we hope for justice, but there is none; for salvation, but it is far from us.

The promised Conqueror 59:14 - 63:6

Preface: situation and remedy 59:14-20

- V14-16a Summary of the situation
 - O V14 Justice is turned back, and righteousness stands far away; for truth has stumbled in the public squares, and uprightness cannot enter.
- V15b-16a The LORD's reaction
 - O Displeased that there was no justice.
 - O Wondered that there was no intercessor.
 - Wondered. He sees the extent of His people's helplessness.
- V16b-17 The LORD's response
 - o The LORD Himself acts.
 - o Picture of a soldier dressing for battle.
- V18-20 Results
 - To His enemies: a Conqueror who repays them for their deeds and causes them to fear the LORD.
 - Not true belief.
 - O To His people: a Redeemer who saves them.
 - O Zion becomes the center of the world.

The Covenant Mediator and His achievement 59:21 - 60:22

- The first of four passages about the Executor of the LORD's purposes
 - o 59:21 Bearer of God's word
 - o 61:1-4 The day of favor and vengeance
 - o 61:10-11 The garments of salvation and righteousness
 - o 63:1-6 The returning Conqueror
- 59:21 The Covenant Mediator
 - o The LORD speaking to the Covenant Mediator.
 - One who has His Spirit
 - One who has His words.
 - The covenant: God's word will abide forever with His people.

- 60:1-22 The universal city
 - O V1-3 The glory of the Lord in Zion
 - You. Feminine singular. The city Zion.
 - Darkness covers the world
 - The Lord's glory on Zion gives light to the world.
 - The nations come to the light.
 - o V4-9 The world in Zion
 - Sons and daughters come
 - The wealth of the world comes
 - They are accepted at the Lord's altar.
 - Zion is radiant with joy and made beautiful by the Lord.
 - V10-14 The city of destiny
 - Foreigners shall build Zion.
 - Her gates are open continually to receive the wealth of the nations.
 - Those who will not serve her will perish.
 - She will be called the City of the LORD.
 - o V15-22 Zion transformed
 - From forsaken, hated, and shunned to majestic and a joy forever with a Savior.
 - Transformed materially, socially, spiritually.
 - Illuminated by the Lord.
 - People made righteous and a mighty nation.
 - To be accomplished in its time.
 - That the Lord might be glorified.
- 61:1-9 The Anointed One and His transforming work
 - O V1-4 First testimony of the Anointed One: transformation
 - The Anointed One speaking
 - Three-part testimony
 - V1a His preparation
 - V1b-3a His task
 - V3b-4 His results: transformation
 - V 5-9 Transformation elaborated
 - V5-6 World community, with willing service.
 - V7a Transformed from shame to a double portion
 - V7b Everlasting joy
 - V8 Brought into covenant with the Lord
 - V9 Under divine blessing

- 61:10 62:12 The Savior and His gathered people
 - o 61:10 62:7 Second testimony of the Anointed One: acceptance of the role of Savior
 - The Anointed One speaking
 - A poem in four sections; two alternating pairs
 - 61:10-11 Joy in the work of salvation
 - Clothed me with the garment of salvation. Prepared for the work.
 - Covered me with the robe of righteousness. God's salvation is accomplished in righteousness.
 - 62:4-5 Joy in transformed Zion
 - No longer forsaken and desolate
 - Delighted in by the Lord
 - 62:1-3 A single Intercessor
 - Continues until the work is completed
 - Zion's righteous and salvation are accomplished.
 - Her glory is seen by all the nations.
 - She is a crown of beauty in the hand of the Lord.
 - 62:6-7 A company of intercessors
 - Set as watchmen on the walls
 - To call upon the Lord unceasingly until the work is completed.
 - o 62:8-12 The Lord's oath, summons, and proclamation
 - V8-9 Oath
 - Secure possession of the harvest.
 - Indicates peace and security.
 - V10 Summons to pilgrimage
 - A way prepared for the people (Israel) and the peoples (the nations)
 - V11-12 Proclamation
 - God's salvation comes
 - His reward...recompense is with Him. The people gathered from across the world.
 - The Holy People. God's people finally perfected.
 - Sought Out, A City Not Forsaken. Zion finally perfected.

- 63:1-6 The consummation of the work
 - With the watchmen on Zion's walls to hear the proclamation of the completion of vengeance, redemption, and salvation.
 - V1 A figure appears in the distance. Question: Who is this?
 - Coming from Edom, Israel's continual enemy.
 - o In victory, as David.
 - Splendid apparel. As 61:10 garment of salvation; robe of righteousness.
 - Marching in greatness of strength

Answer: It is I.

- Speaking in righteousness
- Mighty to save
- V2 The figure comes closer. Question: Why is your apparel red?

Answer: I have trodden the winepress of wrath

- Trampled the peoples in anger
- Garments stained by their blood.
- A day of vengeance and a day of redemption
- Done alone.
- Lifeblood poured out on the earth. The work of wrath decisively finished.

The new heavens and new earth: prayers and promises 63:7 - 66:24

The watcher praying 63:7 - 64:12

- The prophet as a watcher on the walls of Jerusalem.
- 63:7-14 Remembering who God is
 - V7 His steadfast love
 - o V8-9 His commitment to His people
 - O V10-14 His ongoing patience with their failings
- 63:15 64:12 Asking
 - o 63:15-16 Where is Your love?
 - o 63:17-19 Why do You remain distant?
 - o 64:1-3 Why didn't You act?
 - o 64:4-5 You act for those who wait for You. Is it too late to hope?
 - o 64:6-7 We have sinned and are helpless before You.
 - o 64:8-9 You are our Father; we are your people.
 - o 64:10-12 Your city Zion is a wilderness. Will You ignore these things?

The Lord responding 65:1 - 66:24

- 65:1-12 Reaching out to the peoples and to the people
 - o 65:1 Reaching out to the nations
 - o 65:2-7 Reaching out to Israel
 - V2-5 Provocations
 - V6-7 Penalties
 - o 65:8-10 Recompense for the faithful remnant
 - Preservation
 - Secure dwelling
 - Renewal
 - o 65:11-12 Recompense for the wicked
 - Slaughter
- 65:13-16 Contrasting ends
- 65:17-25 All things made new
 - o V17 New creation
 - New heavens and earth
 - V18-20 New city
 - Jerusalem a city of joy and gladness
 - o V21-25 New society
 - Security of tenure
 - Fulfillment in blessing
 - Nature renewed

- 66:1-24 Judgment and hope
 - V1-2 God's resting place
 - A physical building cannot contain God.
 - He comes to dwell with those who are humble, contrite in spirit, tremble at God's word
 - O V3-4 False worship and its end
 - Levitical sacrifices are like idol-worship for those who will not listen to God.
 - For them, harsh treatment is coming. Their fears will come upon them.
 - V5-6 True worship and its end
 - True worship is trembling at God's word
 - True worshippers hope in God but are presently put to shame.
 - One day their hope will be vindicated and their enemies put to shame.
 - O V7-14 The coming glory of Jerusalem
 - Brought into being in a day.
 - Those who mourn now over her will rejoice.
 - All that Zion means will be present to be enjoyed to the fullest.
 - She will be a city of peace and comfort
 - O V15-17 The Lord's judgment
 - The Lord will come in fire of judgment
 - Those who worship falsely will come to an end.
 - V18-23 the world gathering
 - All nations will be gathered
 - A sign will be set among them. The cross.
 - Missionaries sent to those who have not heard of God's fame or seen His glory.
 - Believers will be brought from all nations as an offering to the Lord.
 - Thus all nations will worship Him.
 - o V24 The end of the wicked
