The Worthy Walk Ephesians 4:1-6

"Walking" is a simple but effective word picture.

If I say – walk a mile in my shoes, I'm appealing to you to see life from my path.

If I warn you to – *watch where you step* or *tread lightly*, I'm worried about where your *life is headed*.

So your walk is your lifestyle, and there are good walks & bad walks.

Your Bible likes the *walking metaphor*, too, w/ many examples (**OT/NT**).

Psa 1:1 – How blessed is the man who does not **walk** in the way of the wicked!

Psa 82:5 - They do not know nor do they understand; they walk about in darkness.

2 Cor 5:7 – for we walk by faith, not by sight

1 John 1:7 – if we walk in the Light as He Himself is in the Light, we have fellowship with one another & the blood of Jesus His Son cleanses us from all sin.

One more, this one from the pen of the Apostle Paul:

Eph 4:1 - walk in a manner worthy of the calling with which you have been called

Let's begin the *second half* of Ephesians by turning together to 4:1-6!

Most of Paul's letters can be simply *outlined* in **two** *points*: the **first** *half* is *teaching* (doctrine) & the **second** *half* is *instruction* (lifestyle).

Today's text **begins** the *instructive half* of Ephesians with Paul's call to *walk worthy* of the gospel. So let's take some basic *walking lessons*!

How to walk like a Christian.

- 1. The call to the Christian walk (v.1).
- 2. The *steps* of the Christian walk (vv.2-3).
- 3. The *fuel* for the Christian walk (vv.4-6).

Paul steps into the second half of his letter with a forceful call to walk like a Christian (v.1).

- 1. Many Engl translations lose the *force* of Paul's words. In the Gr he lit. wrote this: *I implore you*, therefore, *I the prisoner of the Lord*, to walk worthy of the calling with which you've been called.
 - a. So the *very first words* of Paul's *instructions for living* are **not** a calm suggestion, but an impassioned command, implying his *authority* (apostle) ...
 - b. ...**and** spelling out the *price* he's personally paid to *walk* the gospel & *speak* the gospel *into the lives* of the Ephesians.
 - c. So for the 2^{nd} time the apostle reminds this church that he is *imprisoned* for them. We've just read in 3:1-I, Paul, the prisoner of Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles.
 - d. If you *loved* Paul & you *loved* the gospel you couldn't *walk away* from a call like this!
- 2. Paul is *summoning* every Christian to *walk worthy* of their gospel calling.
 - a. Again, "to walk" is a common but clear picture of the way you live your life. Your walk is your *lifestyle*.
 - b. The "calling" Paul refers to is "God's effectual call to salvation thru faith in Jesus." If we pull together a few verses Paul has already penned in Eph we can better understand what the Bible means by "the calling" & "our call" (have them **turn & read** w/ you):
 - i. **1:4-5** *Our call* began w/God's sovereign *choice* of us in eternity past, *predestining* us to spiritual adoption. Christian, *God did not chose you* based on your *worth*. He *did not chose you* based on some response He saw in you. *He just chose you*!
 - ii. **1:13** *Our call* then **FF**s to the time we *heard* the gospel, and *believed*, and were *sealed in Christ* by the Holy Spirit, who was *given* to us, *never to leave* us.

- iii. **2:8-9** It is important to understand that even the faith to trust Christ was God's sovereign & gracious gift; a part of *our call*.
- iv. Paul summed all this truth up for us in **Rom 8:29-30** For those whom God **foreknew**, He also **predestined** to become conformed to the image of His Son, so that He would become the firstborn of many brethren; and those whom He **predestined** He also **called**, and those whom He **called** He also **justified**; and those whom He **justified**, He also **glorified**.
- c. Paul pulls together our *gospel calling* & our *daily walk* with a compelling idea: *worthy*... Your life should be *worthy* of the gospel that saved you!
 - i. This is another *idea* Paul loves *worthiness*.
 - ii. His Gr term is αξιος. Your can trace it to the idea of a merchant's scale whatever you put in the right side needs be balanced by what you put in the left. Thus equity or deservedness or worthiness.
 - iii. Do you get Paul's *point*? ... God has graciously put the Gospel of Jesus (*death, resurrection, forgiveness, new life, eternal life*) in the scales for you (*saved*!) you now must respond by *putting your life in scales for Him*.
 - iv. So how does it balance...? What a profound picture!

Paul then maps out the challenge of the gospel-worthy walk with five first steps (read vv.2-3).

- 1. They say "every journey begins w/a single step." You begin your worthy walk with these 5 first steps: humility, gentleness, patience, loving forbearance, & unity. Each of these steps leads straight to the next.
- 2. The worthy walk begins w/humility. Humility is (lit.) lowliness of mind.
 - a. The pagan culture of Paul's day *despised humility*, there wasn't even a Greek word for it! Christians *coined* the Gr vocab Paul used!
 - b. Yet from the first teachings of *Jesus*, the necessity of *starting out* with *humility* was clear:
 - i. Jesus taught (1st Beatitude, Sermon on Mt) "Blessed are the **poor** in spirit." We have nothing & need God!
 - ii. Later our Lord said (Mt 11) "Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am **gentle** and **humble** in heart, and YOU WILL FIND REST FOR YOUR SOULS."
 - c. The **NT**, echoing the **OT**, cautions us that *God is opposed to the proud, but gives grace to the humble.*
 - d. **OBTW**, the *opposite* of **humility** & the *enemy* of **humility** is *pride*! One of the best defenses against pride is to *honestly examine* your own **weakness** & to *continually study* God's **greatness**.
- 3. *Humility* leads to *gentleness*.
 - a. What do you *picture* when someone is described as "gentle?" Timid? Wimpy? Weak?
 - b. That's *not* what Paul had in mind! Paul's word suggested "*strength* under control". He would have also used it to describe a *well-trained* thoroughbred race horse. Manageable, useful but hardly weak!
 - c. *Gentleness* is a *fruit of the Spirit*, which means that Christians will grow *gentler* & thus *more self-controlled* with time.

- d. We should carefully understand that *gentleness* does *not* necessarily rule-out *anger* & *strong responses*. Controlling your *spiritual* & *emotional* power means you *get angry* at the right times & *reign it in* at the wrong times.
 - i. The *right times* are when **God** is *blasphemed* or our **neighbor** is treated *unjustly*.
 - ii. The *wrong times* are when we are *knee-jerk angry* because something just didn't go our way.
- e. **Jesus** was a perfect example of this balance.
 - i. When the *greedy scribes* turned the Temple into a *religious rummage sale*, Jesus drove them out w/ a *whip*.
 - ii. When the Pharisees & Romans gave Him an *excruciating* beating before crucifying Him, He held His *tongue* & held back the *angels* & trusted His *Heavenly Father*.
- 4. *Gentleness* leads to *patience*. Paul's word suggests the ability *to suffer under some hardship for a long time*. It's another *fruit of the Spirit*.
 - a. *Noah* was patient. He *built the Ark* in his backyard & *preached judgment* in his neighborhood for **120** years. All that time it *never rained* but patient Noah *never stopped*.
 - b. *Abraham* was patient (most of the time). God promised Abraham & Sarah a child when he was **75**. The couple waited **25** years for their son *Isaac* to arrive!
 - c. *Jesus* was patient (*all of the time*). He patiently *taught & led & refereed* the spiritually slow *disciples* for **three** years, molding them into the *spiritually elite unit* that He then used to *build His church*.

- 5. Patience results in **loving forbearance** "showing **tolerance** for one another in love."
 - a. *Tolerance* would have been essential for bringing formerly *hostile* groups *together* in the Church. Groups like *Gentiles* & former *Jews* who had come to faith in Christ.
 - b. Paul makes it clear this isn't simply "grit your teeth tolerance"! It is agape-powered forbearing. It's forbearing marinated in love.
 - c. The actions & attitudes that *hold together* a church for a long time require *unconditional* & *unselfish* & *sacrificial* love *godly love*!
- 6. So *fifth step*, when all of these *attitudes* pave the path, *unity* waits at the finish line (**read v.3**).
 - a. Our goal is to experience the *unity* created by the Holy Spirit. We *are* united because the *Spirit* lives in every individual Christian & He also (2:22) dwells in the *Church*.
 - b. Yet we are still responsible to strive to *promote & protect* our unity.
 - c. Taking these first steps with one another *humility & gentleness & patience & loving forbearance* will lead us to *peace & unity*.
 - d. By making *unity* the destination of this **5**-*point set of directions*, the apostle is once again *underlining* the importance of *unity* among God's people.

Every step you take burns calories. Every journey requires fuel. Paul has fuel for the worthy walk (read vv.4-6).

- 1. Our *fuel* is a *high octane blend* of the truths we all *embrace* & *experience* as Christians.
 - a. These are truths we all believe about God,
 - b. These are truths about what God has done in every one of us.
 - c. These are truths that are very *fundamental*. (They also very *Trinitarian*.)
 - d. These are truths that *unite us*.
- 2. We are *united* by the truth about the **one** *Holy Spirit*.
 - a. (**OBTW**, the word "one" shows up **7X** in these **3** short verses. Paul's point, of course, is *shared*, **non**-negotiable truths \rightarrow unity!)
 - b. The *one body* is the *body of Christ*, which is the *church* (cf 1:22-23). The *church* is the *biggest theme* in Ephesians.
 - c. We've already examined our *calling* with **v.1** *God's effectual call to salvation thru faith in Jesus*.
 - i. Salvation requires faith in God's promises, which includes forgiveness of sins & the gift of eternal life. These promises are our hope! Hope in the Bible never means a wish hope never suggests uncertainty it means assurance that God will keep His promises in His time.
 - ii. Every Christian shares the *one unifying hope* that God has *forgiven* his/her sins & now *heaven* is waiting!

- 3. We are *united* by the truth about the **one** *Lord* (5).
 - a. Jesus is Lord! (Can you say that w/me? Amen!) Lord is one of the most popular NT titles for Jesus & it means "master" or "boss." Every Christian, young or old, rich or poor, high or low has the same master Lord Jesus.
 - b. Jesus is the *hero* of the gospel! That's what Paul means (5) by *one* faith the doctrines & commandments of Jesus' Good News. Here is one faith we all embrace:
 - i. God demonstrated His own love toward us in that while we...
 - ii. Then God raised Jesus from the grave on the 3rd day (the angel said "Why do you seek the Living One among the dead, He is not here, He has risen, just as He said!")
 - iii. Jesus is alive & lives & rules forever. He offers you forgiveness & a new heart & eternal life if you turn to Him & trust in Him.
 - iv. That's the one true faith!
 - c. Jesus commands each & every believer to publically testify of your faith by *believer's baptism*. That's the *one baptism* in v.5.
 - i. Jesus commanded: **go** into all the world, **preach** the one faith, **make** disciples, **teach** disciples, ... & **baptize** those disciples!
 - ii. *Believer's baptism* is kind of like a *new soldier* taking the public *oath of enlistment*.
 - iii. Jesus commands *every* believer to be *baptized* if you *won't* tell the world that you are a *good soldier of Christ* by *obeying* this *first command*, how can you claim to be His disciple?

- 4. The unifying truth about the **one** true *God* –our *Father in Heaven* (**read v.6**).
 - a. Our God as *our Father* is a repeated truth in Ephesians....
 - i. There is only *one* God, the God of Bible.
 - ii. And God has *adopted* us, thus we are His *children*.
 - iii. Be *careful*! When Paul writes that God is "Father of **all**" he means all Christians. The context makes that very clear: all who share one body, one Spirit, one calling, one hope, one Lord, one gospel faith, one obedient baptism.
 - iv. By God's grace, that's us!
 - b. Paul concludes with a *hat-trick* of *prepositions* that *bind* us to God & to *one another*: *over* & *through* & *in*.
 - i. Our Father is *over* us **all!** God is *sovereign*. Our King!
 - ii. Our Father is *through* us **all**! God is *omnipotent* (all powerful), and He *works through us*!
 - 1. **2:10** –We are **His workmanship**, created in Christ Jesus for good works, that we might **walk** in them!
 - iii. Our Father is *in* us **all**! God is *omnipresent*. Particularly, the *Father* is in every one of His *children*. Last Sunday we read:
 - 1. **3:17** that Christ may dwell in your hearts thru faith!
 - 2. **3:19** that you may be filled up w/all the fullness of God!

We belong to the *one true God*. And so, we are all *one*!

It is very *intentional* & very *important* that Paul began the "*instructive*" half of his letter with this *call to unity*.

Which means we should think of "preserving unity" as a fundamental duty of our Christian lives.

So consider this, in closing:

- You can't walk alone! The Christian life is not the life of a spiritual loner.
 - Do not forsake the assembling of yourselves together.
- *You can't dawdle*! The Christian life involves *hard spiritual work* to attain *unity*.
 - There is nothing *easy* about *humility*, *gentleness* (\rightarrow *self-control*), *patience*, *unselfish love*, & *diligence*.
 - There is nothing *popular* today about insisting on *one body of truth & practice*.

The *worthy walk* is a *long walk*...sometimes it will seem like an *uphill walk*...but don't *give up* or *get distracted* – the *view* will be worth *the climb*.
