How to Live Wisely

PROVERBS 1–9

THE DEFINITION OF WISDOM

Wisdom is a skill—the relational skill of pleasing God in every facet of life.

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- Do I repent when God corrects me? (1:20–33)
- Do I cry—even *hunt*—for God's correction? (2:1–22)
- Does how I work, make decisions, handle money, and react to trials show that God is central in my life? (3:1–12)

• Do I keep on obeying God's word, keep on resisting temptation, and keep on guarding my heart? (4:1–27)

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- Do I keep on resisting the seductive power of sexual adultery? (7:1–27)
- Will I remain committed to following Jesus? (8:1–36)

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A relationship with God is best pictured by marriage. Like marriage, it's a relationship that encompasses all of life. Like marriage, this relationship with God is entered into decisively, yet it's not once-and-done. It involves daily recommitment and continual strengthening, even as we fight regular temptation.

APPLYING PROVERBS 9
