Why Can't They Believe? John 12:36-43 Reading: Genesis 1:26 – 2:3

Explain preaching plan.

Let's begin by reading this morning's text: John 12:36-43.

Jesus finishes His three year public ministry with an *invitation* and a *judgment*.

"Believe in the Light while you still have time."

Then He goes into *hiding*.

The crowds *refuse* to believe in Him.

The Messiah God sent was not the Messiah Jerusalem wanted!

Next stop: *the cross*.

In this morning's text, John examines why the Jewish nation *turned* on Jesus so quickly.

- 1. (vv.36-37) Startling rejection. But *who* rejects *who*...?
- 2. (vv.38-41) Divine sovereignty. They *can't* believe.
- 3. (vv.42-43) Human responsibility. They *won't* believe.

How was Jesus' final invitation received?

- 1. John records v.36 as Jesus' *final gospel invitation* to Israel. Israel's *last chance* to follow Jesus (first Advent) as Messiah.
 - a. V.38 "While you have the Light, believe in the Light, so that you may become children of Light."
 - b. Jesus spoke of *urgency*!
 - i. "While you have the Light..."
 - ii. This hint of *warning* makes it very *clear* that God won't *hold open the door* forever.
 - c. Jesus spoke of *invitation*!
 - i. "...believe in the Light..." The Light of the World is Jesus!
 - ii. The *necessity* of real faith is *huge* in John; it is the *condition* of salvation!
 - iii. 3:16 "whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life."
 - d. Jesus spoke of *regeneration* and *transformation*!
 - i. "...so that you may become children of Light."
 - ii. When you *believe in Jesus* (Light) you *become new* and you *act like it.*
- 2. Then Jesus abruptly hid Himself from the Passover crowds.
 - a. His *claim* to be the Messiah (Light) was on the table, His *invitation* to believe in Him was clear.
 - b. This concluded **three years** of *public preaching*, *doing good*, *changing lives*, *confronting hypocrites*, and *working signs* (John 1-12, etc.).

- 3. But now His *inviting*, followed by His *hiding*, was an act of **divine** judgement. *Why...*?
 - a. Follow as I read v.37.
 - b. Despite three years of working *more signs than you can count* (though John highlights seven)...
 - i. ...most recently the raising of Lazarus from the dead...
 - c. (37.b) ... yet they were not believing in Him.
 - d. Which means they had *rejected* Jesus as Israel's Messiah. Because He **wasn't** the kind of *militant* Messiah they wanted.
 - i. They wanted a Messiah on a *chariot*, not a Savior on a *cross*; they wanted a Conqueror with a *crown*, **not** a Christ with a *crown of thorns*.
 - ii. Picture the *dramatic shift* that occurs here...!
 - iii. After the Triumphal Entry, when Jesus began to speak clearly about His *cross* and His *death*, the crowd *turned away* (read vv.32-34).
 - 1. "Just what kind of Son of Man are you!?!"

Israel rejected Jesus, and Jesus rejected Israel.

How could that be??! *How could they <u>not</u> believe*??! John explains why the Jews <u>can't believe</u>. (Read v.38-41)

- 1. John is going to cite the **OT** prophet **Isaiah** *twice* to explain that they *don't* believe because they *can't* believe. It's a matter of *divine sovereignty*.
- 2. Our author *first* appeals to **Isa 53**, the *Suffering Servant* passage, the **OT** clearest prediction of Jesus and His *death on the cross*.

a. Please turn w/ me to Isa 53 (<u>read v.1</u>).

- b. Let's consider **two** key words: *believe* (1.a) and *revealed* (1.b).
- c. 53:1.**a** Isaiah begins by indicating that His message of God's Servant will *not be believed*.
- d. 53:1.**b** It goes on to ask *to whom* has God *revealed* the *Arm of the Lord*?
 - i. The "Arm of the Lord" implies God's strength revealed & exercised in His Servant (His Son Jesus).
- e. As Isa 53 continues, **no one** will believe in Him because:
 - i. (v.2) *He has not stately form or majesty that we should believe in Him*;
 - ii. Thus (v.3) *He was despised and rejected by men.*
- f. The Servant did **not** satisfy *earthly standards* of *majesty*. Jesus was **not** the Messiah Jerusalem was looking for!
- 3. So John has *established* that although God's message of a suffering Messiah is *true*, *clear*, and *validated in power*, very few *believed*.

- Then John provides the *reason* they couldn't believe (v.39 for this reason they could not believe). He finds that *reason* by going back to Isaiah a second time, from an *earlier passage*.
 - a. **Vs.40** refers to **Isaiah 6:10**, a part of Isaiah's calling to the prophet ministry. John now applies this verse to the Jews' *rejection* of Jesus.
 - b. Why can't Israel believe Jesus? God's judgment. Read v.40.
 - i. God has *blinded* their eyes (despite seeing Jesus and His signs).
 - ii. God had *hardened* their hearts (despite hearing truths that *cut straight* to the thoughts and intentions of the heart).
 - iii. As a result of God's *hardening (judgment)*, they *could* **not**/*would* **not** *see, understand, turn* and be *spiritually healed*.
- 5. John summarizes (41) that Isaiah *spoke* because he saw an *exalted vision of the glory of Jesus* (6) and later predicted the *suffering of Jesus* (53).
 - a. Didn't Jesus say (8:56) that "Abraham rejoiced to see My day and he saw it and was glad"?; (58) "Truly, truly, I say to you, before Abraham was born, I Am."
 - b. If *Abraham* saw the glory of Jesus, why not *Isaiah...*?
 - c. **OBTW** John's use of **two** Isaiah passages, one *early* and one *late*, confirms the *singe authorship* of the OT *Book of Isaiah*.
 - i. Only one man wrote Isaiah Isaiah son of Amoz.
 - ii. That *validates the integrity* of every one of its *amazing* and *inerrant prophecies*.

- 6. John has just used Isaiah to explain that Christ *hardened* Israel because Israel *rejected* Christ the Suffering Servant.
 - a. But that's not the end of the story. **J. MacArthur** reminds us that God *brought good*, and will bring further *good*, out of Israel's *judgment* (Romans 11).
 - i. God's *hardening* of Israel *made a place* for the Gentiles to enter the Kingdom. **Rm 11:11** – *I say then, they* [Israel] *did not stumble so as to fall, did they? May it never be! But by their transgression salvation has come to the Gentiles, to make them* [Israel] *jealous.*
 - ii. One day, Israel's *jealousy* will finally bring them, as a people, to Messiah Jesus (Tribulation).
 - iii. **Rom. 11:26** And so all Israel will be saved, as it is written: "The Deliverer will come out of Zion, and He will turn away ungodliness from Jacob."

It is God's sovereign right/judgment to harden sinner's hearts.

Yet the Jews are an example of *human responsibility*. God sent them *Jesus*, but they chose *man*. (Read vv.42-43.)

- 1. Jesus' adversaries were *hardened* under His judgment (v.40 *He has blinded their eyes*).
 - a. *Nevertheless* (42), they were **not** *spiritual robots* they *bear responsibility* for their judgment.
 - b. They willfully, intentionally *considered* Jesus, but ultimately were unwilling to *give up* what they really valued...man's *respect*.
- 2. *No less a class* than the leaders of the people (42) *weighed* Jesus' works and His claims, and found them *credible believable*.
 - a. John goes so far as to say many even of the rulers believed in Him.
 - b. That seems *huge*! *Faith* is the prerequisite for God's *forgiveness* and *gift of eternal life*!
 - c. Were these men truly saved !?!
 - d. But John goes on to write that they were not openly confessing Him.
 Gr. Imp "not confessing" → repeated refusal to publicly acknowledge Him as Israel's Messiah.
 - e. *Why...?* Fear! If they *followed* Jesus the Pharisees would *excommunicate* them from the *synagogues* (centers of Jewish life).
 - f. "What will people think of me? How could I sustain my position as a leader in the community?"
 - g. So even though Jesus had just promised that the *Father would honor them,* they chose the *approval of men* rather than the *approval of God.*

- 3. Jesus said genuine faith includes *counting the cost*.
 - a. These men did indeed *count* the cost, but they chose the *glory* of men over the *glory* of God.
 - b. And as Israel's leaders *turned from Jesus*, the crowds and the nation *turned* with them.
- 4. As you hold these two truths together (*sovereignty & responsibility*), there is a dynamic that God *hardens* the hearts of those who persistently *reject* Him.
 - a. Wm Hendriksen He is the God of love. He is not a cruel monster who deliberately and with inward delight prepares people for everlasting damnation. On the contrary, he earnestly warns, proclaims the Gospel, and states – as Jesus did repeatedly during His earthly ministry – what will happen if people believe, also what will happen if they do not. He even urges them to walk in the light. But when people of their own accord and after repeated threats and promises, reject Him and spurn His messages, then – and not until then – he hardens them, in order that those who were not willing to repent may not be able to repent.
- 5. The Jews of Jesus' day judged Him and hardened their hearts against Him.
 - a. They were completely *responsible* for their unbelief.
 - b. But as John points out, Christ also hardened their hearts. And their hearts remain hard until this day.

Human responsibility – "they loved the approval of men rather than God."

Divine Sovereignty – "for this reason they could not believe...He has blinded their eyes and He hardened their heart"

Both are *true*, and there is certainly *divine mystery* involved.

And there is also *clear* warning!

Are you *consumed* with the approval of your friends? Afraid of their *disapproval*?

God's approval is *far greater*.

Are you *putting-off* confessing Christ?

Time runs out!

"While you have the light, believe in the Light, so that you may become sons of Light."

...pray...

"O Great God"
