 - -The Law functions like a guardian who disciplines minor children with a view to their justification (v. 24).

Practical Lessons

- 1) It happens at some points in history, that relatively few understand God's redemptive purposes revealed in the Bible.
- 2) The Law reveals God in His holiness, man in his sinfulness, and Christ in His completeness.
