- 1. _____: We will study Who God is by observing what He says and does. He is the central focus of the Bible.
- His ______: God reveals much to us about Himself through His creation. How He created the world, what He used to create it, and the purpose behind creation all display aspects of His character.

3. ______: The Bible clearly reveals how and why God created man, and His expectations for man. It also addresses the issues of purpose and destiny.

The Bible was written in a progressive sequence.

As in a drama, there is one cohesive plot with both a beginning and an end. The world is the stage, history the backdrop, men and angels the participants. There is a sequential flow to the events—a cumulative building of information which leads to a climax. The focus of drama is clearly on ______ and His glory.

 The Old Testament, written approximately between 1400-400 B.C., contains books which can be divided into Law (Torah), History, Wisdom, and the Prophets. 	
• The New Testament, written approximately between 45-95 A.D. contains books. Five are historical, one is prophetic, and the rest are epistles (letters).

God alone existed in eternity: He is eternal.

The God of the Bible has no ______. He has always existed. In contrast, the universe is not eternal. There was a time when man, animal, earth, space, light, and matter did not exist. The universe, both seen and unseen, was brought into existence by God (cf. Gen. 1:1 ; Col. 1:16).

Psalm 90:2

Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever You had formed the earth and the world, even from everlasting to everlasting, You are God."

God is present everywhere: He is immanent.

God is not distant or uninvolved with His creation (cf. Jer. 23:23-24). Rather, God is intimately involved within

His creation, yet He does not exist within any created thing (cf. Job 12:10, Acts 17:24-

25). Since He is ______, in all places simultaneously,

nothing is hidden from Him (cf. Ps. 139:7-12).

God surpasses His creation: He is transcendent.


