- I. Background: Jews, Gentiles, Exile, and Occupation
 - A. (early Old Testament, 1500-700 BC) Israel: God's chosen people
 - B. (later Old Testament, 700-400 BC) the Jews in exile (2 Chronicles 36:11-21; Ezra 9-10)
 - C. (between the Testaments, 450 BC AD 50) Judea under occupation
- II. Galatians 1-2: should Jewish Christians stop eating with Gentile Christians?
 - A. Paul believes that a great deal rides on this question.
 - B. He pins the question of *how we are justified* on it.
 - C. Antioch: the most important major city near Judea, with a huge Jewish population
 - D. James and Peter think that they are right in not eating with Gentile Christians
- III. Acts 15: do Gentile Christians have to act like Jews in order to follow Christ?
 - A. Separate question, separate time.
 - Paul's first visit to Jerusalem after his conversion, AD 37 (Galatians 1:18-20)
 - Paul's second visit to Jerusalem, AD 48 (Acts 11:27-30; Galatians 2:1-10)
 - Embassy from James, later AD 48 (Galatians 2:11-14)
 - "Judaizing" group goes to Asia Minor, Paul writes Galatians, early AD 49
 - Jerusalem council, later AD 49
 - B. The rules are minimal. (see Genesis 8:20-9:17)
 - C. "Natural law" or "moral law." Specific application varies from culture to culture.
- IV. Romans 14: Do Jews have to act like Gentiles to follow Christ?
 - A. Background ...
 - B. Eating together: should I serve my Jewish Christian friend bacon?
 - C. No: don't judge your brother for keeping with his culture, and don't force him to break the rules he is used to (if you can help it).
- V. From one culture to another What lessons can we take from the Jewish/Gentile question?
 - A. The gospel creates tremendous freedom for all who believe in it (Galatians 5:1; Luke 10:27-28; James 1:25; 2:8)
 - B. Sometimes love will lead us to conform to cultural expectations, sometimes to ignore them (1 Corinthians 9:19-23; Acts 17:21-26; Galatians 5:2)
 - C. Every church, Jewish and Gentile, should cherish the inheritance of God's word. (Titus 1:12-13; John 4:22; Ephesians 5:19; Colossians 3:16; 1 Corinthians 4:26)
 - D. Every church, Jewish or Gentile, should remove unnecessary obstacles to others understanding the gospel (1 Corinthians 14:21-25)
 - E. Every church should be careful not to pass judgment on aspects of church life that are not clearly biblically important.
 - F. How to express the unity of the gospel across cultures: sharing a table together (Acts 2:42; 4:32-37; Ephesians 4:28; Acts 6; Galatians 6:10; Acts 11:27-30 with Galatians 2:10; 1 Corinthians 16:1-3; 2 Corinthians 8-9)
