	When the Bells express their uncertainty about the Bible and its meaning, this mindset of skepticism and doubt eventually extends to all of the foundational pillars of the historical Christian faith:

- the reliability of Scripture and its divine inspiration, authority, inerrancy, sufficiency, and perpiscuity (or clarity)
- the deity of Christ
- the concept of justification by faith in the substitutionary sacrifice of Christ on the cross
- the plain teaching of Scripture concerning what is evil and sinful
- the very nature of God is "up for grabs" according to this way of thinking!

#### 17 On the subject of homosexuality

■ MacArthur quotes Brian McLaren - the Emerging Church leader, as saying that he is not sure "what we should think about homosexuality." MacArthur says, "He called for a five-year moratorium on making any pronouncements about whether homosexuality is sin or not. 'In five years, if we have clarity, we'll speak,' he said. 'If not, we'll set another five years for ongoing reflection.""]

"What makes a postmodern ministry so easy to embrace is that it doesn't demonize youth culture - Marilyn Manson, 'South park,' or gangsta rap, for example - like traditional fundamentalists. ## 21 Why it is necessary to contend for the truth

### ■What is truth?

- Ultimately, the definition of truth itself flows from God!!! In other words, truth, in the absolute sense is theological!!!
- The O.T. refers to the Almighty God of Creation as the "God of truth" [Deut. 32:4; Psa. 31:5; Isa. 65:16]
- Jesus said: "I am ... the truth" [Jn. 14:6] thus making the claim that He Himself is the embodiment (the incarnation) of truth, thereby making the profound claim of His deity!
- John 17:17 says: "Sanctify them by Your truth, Your word is truth."

# 22 Note the implications of these claims:

- All truth must ultimately be defined in terms of God; He is the source of all that exists, and therefore, the meaning of life and existence.
- As MacArthur puts it: "God has revealed Himself to humanity through Scripture and through His Son. Both perfectly embody the essence of what is true."
- "... historically and collectively, Christians have always been in full agreement that whatever is true whatever is objectively and ontologically true is true whether any given individual understands it, likes it, or receives it as truth. In other words, because reality is created and truth is defined by God, what is really true is true for everyone, regardless of anyone's personal perspective or individual preferences."
  John MacArthur

#### 23 This, therefore, necessary to contend for the truth because:

- Because truth is the only thing that can liberate people from the bondage of sin and give them eternal life [John 8:32 & 14:6; Rom. 1:16; I Cor. 1:18; Rom. 10:13-14; I Cor. 1:21].
- Because false teaching [i.e. apostate religion] actually "intensifies sin's bondage," "multiplies sin's pollutions." and "magnifies sin's consequences," i.e. it makes the calamity of sin worse than ever." [Jude 4; Jn. 3:17-19; Il Pet. 3:3 & 2:18-19]
- Because Scripture reveals the reality of an unavoidable cosmic conflict between truth and

error, between Good and evil, and that no one is exempt from this battle! [Jude 6, 14, 11, 14-15, 7, 11; Eph. 6:12; Il Cor. 10:3-5 & 11:13-15].

# 24 🗔

Acts 20:28-31 (NIV) Keep watch over yourselves and all the flock of which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers. Be shepherds of the church of God, which he bought with his own blood. I know that after I leave, savage wolves will come in among you and will not spare the flock. Even from your own number men will arise and distort the truth in order to draw away disciples after them. So be on your guard! Remember that for three years I never stopped warning each of you night and day with tears.
