Hosting others in our homes can be hard. It can be exhausting. Our guests may not be grateful guests. They may make a mess. They may not get the hint when it's time for them to leave. But we are not allowed to grumble about our guests. We kindly care for others rather than complain.

## 1 Peter 4:10-11a

All of the people of God are gifted by God to serve in some way.

Sometimes there is some trial and error involved in figuring out how God has gifted us and where we serve best in the church.

The goal of these gifts is not the exaltation of the gifts themselves or the exaltation of the one who's got the gift(s). The goal of these gifts is the good of God's people in your local church. The presence and importance of the local church and our ongoing involvement with the local church is assumed and implied in these verses. We follow Jesus in community (the church).

We are stewards/managers of God's multicolored, kaleidoscopic grace. There is great variety, but it's all of God.

We must do "the Lord's work in the Lord's way." The gifts and strength are God's, not ours. We are simply stewards and servants. We are managers and ministers. How we speak and how we serve in the church must reflect and honor the Giver of this grace.

## 1 Peter 4:11b

God's **g**\_\_\_\_\_ is the **e**\_\_\_\_ of everything. God has given us gifts of grace for the good of others and for His glory. God sends us strength as we serve Him for the good of others and for His glory. And that endgame is just fine with us!
