A Wise Reprover and a Listening Ear

Proverbs 25:11-12

Introduction to Proverbs

- 1. Proverbs is fundamentally *Wisdom Literature*. Concrete, observational, general.
- 2. We are being re-parented in the family of God by our Father, with Jesus as our elder Brother.
- 3. This is not an issue of how to live to be made right with God...but having received the grace of Christ, what does a wise and flourishing life in reverential love for God look like?
- 4. Wisdom is a *cultivated skill* forged in life experiences of crisis and difficulty.

A word fitly spoken

is like apples of gold in a setting of silver. Like a gold ring or an ornament of gold is a wise reprover to a listening ear. (ESV)

the right word at the right time (MSG)

timely advice (NLT)

a receptive ear (CSB)

a word spoken at the right time (CSB)

to the ear of the one who listens (NET)

a word skillfully spoken (NET)

one who listens [to] valid criticism (NLT)

- a word spoken in right circumstances (NASB)
- a ruling rightly given...the rebuke of a wise judge (NIV)

Observations of Proverbs 25:11-12

- 1. What is being described is something of *great beauty and value*.
- 2. Words matter. Not any old words will do.
- 3. Being a *receptive hearer matters*. More than hearing...truly receiving.
- What follows is instruction in creating a *culture of wisdom* and beauty.
- This applies not only to conduct in the church, but between spouses, parents/children, friends, the world.

What is the importance of reproof/rebuke? $^{(2\mathrm{He}}$	ebrew words)	
1. It is a sign of the Father's (and others') delight - 3:12 2. It brings one into the way of life - 6:23 3. It is reciprocated by love when give to the wise - 9:7-8 4. It is a demonstration of love for knowledge - 12:1 5. It brings honor - 13:18 6. It cultivates prudence (skillful living) - 15:5 7. It is sought out by the wise - 15:12 8. It brings one among the wise - 15:31 9. It causes one to gain "heart" - 15:32 10. It imparts further knowledge to the understanding - 19:25 11. It is praiseworthy and brings blessing to the reprover- 24:25 12. It eventually brings favor - 28:23 13. Resistance to it brings death - 29:1/15:10	What is your attitude toward reproof/ rebuke? 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What does it mean to be a "wise reprover"? (1)		
Your Approach		
[®] H <i>umility</i> is foundational.		
•An advocate vs. adversary.		
Beware of attempting to <i>discern</i> motives.		
Be cautious of <i>self-assessment</i> of insight, reading body language, etc.		
Be aware of how your own <i>biases</i> shape our perspective.		
Realize you don't <i>fully understand</i> yourself, much less someone else.		
 Give abundance of love, mercy, and grace for Christ's Remember the difference between weakness vs. sin. 	sake.	
Seek to build a <i>relationship of trust</i> .		
• Take into account the <i>timing</i> of your approach.		
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 What does it mean to be a "wise reprover"? (2) The Conversation Personal vs. impersonal modes of communication. Beware of judicial monologue: the importance of asking good questions. Seek more information (often badly or partially informed, or at worse mis-informed). Beware of sarcasm, derogatory, mocking, and snark. Beware of universal statements and claims of association. Give suggestions: "What do you thinkwhat if you?" Invite their assessment: "Do you think I'm right in? Can you see how?" 		
What does it mean to be a "wise reprover"? (3)]
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• Their Response		
 Treat them with dignity as a little one of the Father. 		
 When response is given, don't assume they are necessarily defensive or self-justifying, but that they are revealing thoughts and heart. 		
• When they are silent, don't assume guilt (catch 22).		
• In hearing their response, become yourself a listening ear.		
• Affirm <i>gratitude</i> for their hearing you out.		
• Give room for them to process and pray.		
• Remember, ultimately they are in the Father's hand and His		
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What does it mean to be a "listening ear"? (1)	
Your Approach	
• Humility is foundational.	
•Do you really desire wisdom and correction?	
Be prayerfully prepared not just to hear, but listen.	
•Realize others see you in ways you have difficulty seeing yourself.	
•Remember that <i>the Father</i> may very well be behind this, even if the do it badly. (vs. process disqualification)	
What does it mean to be a "listening ear"? (2) •Your Immediate Response	
• Acknowledge their feelings even if not your intention.	
• Seek to not be defensive, self-justifying, or counter attack.	
•Ask if they are interested in a response now or later?	
•Ask questions: "How, what, when, would?" "How would you suggest?"	
•Give a soft answer, which will either turn away anger or stir it deeper.	
•Give place to their <i>personality</i> .	
• Affirm <i>gratitude</i> for engaging you and not holding in, for loving you enough to speak to you personally and not to others.	
 What does it mean to be a "listening ear"? (3) Your Ongoing Response Genuinely take what they have said to consider, pray, and ask the Lord for wisdom. Genuinely seek input from others. Consider similar feedback given by others: is there a general theme? Acknowledge: (1) what was right (2) what was partially right (3) what was wrong. Request follow-up. 	
*Give abundant love, mercy, and grace.	
•This may be a time for them to <i>learn wisdom</i> as well by your example.	
Conclusion/Application	
The necessary fruit of the Spirit - LOVE!	
 We must cry out to the Lord for His help. These are <i>general suggestions</i> of regular encounters. There are exceptions to the rule. This is a <i>difficult</i> and <i>delicate</i> work. 	
 Ornaments and jewelry come by digging, purifying fire, hammering, and buffing.
